

Award of Merit will be givento Horticultural Exhibit judged the finest in each Section.

Blue ribbons won in the Corsage and Miniature Classes will apply toward Sweepstakes.

GENERAL RULES

This will be a Standard Show meeting requirements as set by National Council of State Garden Clubs, Inc. ARTISTIC RULES:

- 1. Each exhibitor may enter as many classes as eligibility permits but have only 1 entry in each Class.
- All Artistic entries must be placed by 11 a.m., March 25th.
- 2. Judging will begin at 12:30, with show to open at 3:00 p.m. During judging, the floor will be cleared except for clerks, Awards chairman, Class

- or. Exhibits using fresh plant material must be kept fresh at all times by exhibitor
- or person so designated. 4. No material on Florida Conservation List will be permitted except for educational purposes.

- Backgrounds may be changed but may not interfere with any other exhibit.
- Design will be stressed in all Classes. 6. Reasonable care will be exercised to safeguard properties of exhibitor, but the Show Committee cannot assume responsibility for loss or damage to properties.
- All containers, etc., should be clearly marked with owners name. 7. Classification will be responsible for conformity to schedule of all exhibits.




