#### TRAIL OF BEAUTY

#### GENERAL RULES

- 1. In every respect, this show shall meet the requirement set forth by the National Council of State Garden Clubs, Inc. The 1977 Handbook for Flower Shows shall be the guide for both Judges and Exhibitors. Exocita and Hortus III shall be the authority for Horticulture.
- 2. Competition in both Horticulture and Artistic Design Division is open to any amateur gardener.
- 3. Each exhibitor is allowed only one entry in each class or sub-class.
- 4. Native plant material on the Florida Conservation list may be used in all divisions if lawfully obtained and labeled with the correct botanical name.
- 5. The standard system of awarding shall be used. Judges' decisions are final. Judging will be Friday, March 30 10:30 A.M. until 12:30 P.M.
- 6. FRESH PLANT MATERIAL is emphasized in this show, therefore, exhibitors must keep exhibits fresh or allow the Show Committee to do so. All entries must be in place by 10:00 A.M.
- 7. Exhibitors are requested to read the rules of the Schedule carefully. All exhibits must be passed by the Classification Committees before being placed. These Committees may disqualify entries not conforming to the Schedule, or entries of inferior quality.
- 8. All properties should be marked with exhibitor's name. The Committee will not assume liability for damage or loss of personal property.
- 9. Exhibits may not be removed before 5:00 P.M., Saturday, March 31.

#### RULES - ARTISTIC DESIGN DIVISION

- 1. All entries must be made prior to March 20. Register entries with chairman listed in each designated Section.
- 2. Plant material may be obtained from any source, but floral design must be work of the exhibitor. Backgrounds and bases permitted. Niches are painted off-white.
- 3. No artificial flowers, fruit or foliage permitted. Coloring of fresh plant material is not permitted. Each Section designates the type of materials permitted.
- 4. Treating of dried plant material is allowed in certain specified classes. Contrived flowers of plant material may be used.
- 5. Plant material used should be listed on a 3" x 5" card. Brief explanation of exhibitor's interpretation may be included.
- 6. Designs may be placed between 8:00 and 10:00 A.M., March 30.

#### AWARDS

The Standard System of Awarding shall be used. Only one first (blue), one second (red) and one third (yellow) to be awarded in each class or subclass. One or more honorable mention ribbons (white) may be awarded.

#### National Council TOP AWARDS for Design Division

TRICOLOR, Artistic: A Tricolor Award may be given to a blue ribbon winner in Section A, if all requirements are met.

AWARD OF DISTINCTION, Artistic: An Award of Distinction may be given to a blue ribbon winner in Section B, if all

requirements are met.

CREATIVITY, Artistic: A Creativity Award may be given to a blue ribbon

winner in Section C, if all requirements are met. CREATIVITY, Tables: A Creativity Award may be given to a blue ribbon

winner in Section D, if all requirements are met.

#### National Council TOP AWARDS for Horticulture Division

One Award of HORTICULTURE EXCELLENCE may be given to a named horticulture exhibit judged as the finest in the show, scoring 95 or more.

An AWARD OF MERIT may be offered and awarded to named blue ribbon winners, scoring 95 or over in each of the Sections in the horticulture division, not to exceed a total of five in the entire show.

An ARBOREAL AWARD may be given, if merited, to a blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or more in Section designated, provided entry is correctly labeled with botanical and common names, if possible.

A SWEEPSTAKES AWARD will be given to the winner of the most blues or better in the horticulture division. In case of a tie, the top awards and red and yellow ribbons will be counted.

An EDUCATION AWARD may be given to the winner of the best non-commercial exhibit in DIVISION III SPECIAL EXHIBITS. The exhibit must score 95 or more, be designed to instruct and cover at least 24 square feet.

#### RULES - HORTICULTURE DIVISION

- 1. (a) Horticulture specimens must be registered with Circle Horticulture Chairman beginning February 23 and ending March 23, 1984. Up to 5 additional entries may be made on Wednesday, March 28, from 10:00 A.M. to 1:00 P.M.
  - (b) No entry will be accepted unless submitted on a Horticulture Entry form and made out in full.
  - (c) Circle Horticulture Chairmen will submit entries to Horticulture Entries Chairmen Mrs. George Hudson 345-7296 or Mrs. Mark Cunniff 360-9333 by March 26.
- 2. Horticulture specimens must be of superior quality, labeled with botanical and common names, where possible, and grown by exhibitor for at least three months.
- 3. Amateur gardeners who are not members of the Florida Federation of State Garden Clubs are limited to five (5) entries in Horticulture Division. All commercial or professional growers are excluded from competition.
- 4. Exhibits of inferior quality, or not conforming to the Schedule, will be eliminated by the Classification Committee. The decision of the Classification Committee is final.
- 5. When single growth plants are entered, the one (1) plant, one (1) pot rule applies, except for plants of natural growth pattern of multiplying. (i.e., bromeliads, etc.)
- 6. Containers for all potted plants not to exceed 12" in diameter, except (Special Container Grown) and (Floor Specimens).

Table specimen plants not to exceed 18" in height and floor specimen plants must be 18" or more.

No potted plants will be accepted with hangers except in Hanging Basket or Orchid classes.

- 7. Containers for cut specimens will be furnished.
- 8. Judges may subdivide at their discretion.
- 9. Scales of Points listed in 1977 Handbook, pages 150-154 will be used.




