### DUTIES OF THE SECRETARY

What the Minutes should contain:

- 1. Kind of meeting, regular, special, adjourned, etc.
- 2. Name of the assembly.
- 3. Date of meeting and place, if the club does not have a regular place to meet,
- 4. State the fact of the presence of the Secretary and President.
- 5. Whether the Minutes of the previous meeting were approved or dispensed with.
- All main motions (except withdrawn motions); points of order and appeal, whether sustained or lost.
- 7. And all other motions THAT WERE NOT LOST OR WITHDRAWN.
- Usually the hour of meeting and adjournment is given, if it is solely a business meeting.
- 9. Generally the name of the maker of a MAIN MOTION, but not the seconder.
- 10. SIGNED (Secretary)

Never use "Respectfully submitted" -- it is no longer couth.

If an election takes place, include a full report of all votes cast. This, of course, should come in the report of the tellers.

Corrections should be inserted in the margin with a very carefully drawn line showing the subject matter corrected.

The Secretary should always provide the presiding officer with the agenda for the meeting.

### THE SECRETARY:

- I. Keeps the minutes of the regular sessions and usually of the Board of Directors.
- If the President and Vice Presidents are absent, it is the duty of the Secretary to call the meeting to order and preside at the election of a chairman pro tempore.
- Place in the Minutes what was done -- not what was said or the opinion of the Secretary.
- The Secretary never addresses the chair when called upon to read the Minutes. Par. Practice Page 128.
- 5. The Secretary is the custodian of the records and seal, if incorporated.
- 6. Check the Bylaws carefully to see what additional duties may be included.
- Be on time with the records, a copy of the Bylaws and any other documents likely to be needed.
- A great deal may depend on the accuracy of the Secretary, for remember, the minutes are the legal record of the club.

The question is always on approving the minutes -- but the Secretary's report. The minutes are NOT THE SECRETARY'S REPORT, but the factual record of what was done.

Approving minutes is usually done by general consent. The chair - Are there any corrections to the minutes?: If there are none, the Chair then says. There being none, the minutes stand approved as read.

### WILLIAM BARTRAM

William and his twin sister Elizabeth were born on February 9<sup>th</sup>, 1739, in Kingsessing, some four miles west of Philadelphia. His father was the self-taught – though widely recognized and respected – botanist, John Bartram, who established one of the first horticultural gardens in the colonies. As a consequence, from an early age William was exposed to many of the leading scientific minds in the New World, among them Benjamin Franklin and James Logan. The gardens also drew visitors from Europe, among them Peter Kalm, who had studied with Linnæus, who had devised the system we still use for the classification of plants.

At the age of 14, William began joining his father on his botanical expeditions, showing an early interest in botany and drawing. His father, however, concerned that he would be unable to earn a living in these pursuits, apprenticed him to a Philadelphia merchant, and in 1761 William set off for North Carolina's Cape Fear River, opening a store near his uncle's plantation. Neither his heart nor his mind, though, were in the business, and he was not successful. William was still there, in 1765, when his father wrote that he had been appointed Royal Botanist, and commissioned to explore the new colony of Florida, urging William to settle his affairs and join him on the expedition.

William was so entranced by the beauty and opportunity he saw in Florida that he chose to remain, and with his father's help established an indigo plantation along the St. John. This, too, failed, and following a shipwreck off the Florida coast, he returned to Philadelphia in 1767.

Over the next few years he received commissions for drawings from his father's English patron, Peter Collinson, as well as several of his friends. He also attempted to return to business, again failing, and fled to North Carolina to escape creditors.

About this time, in 1772, he received a commission from a friend of Collinson's, Dr. John Fothergill, to undertake an exploration of the Carolinas, Georgia, and Florida, reporting what he found of interest, and supplying him with new and interesting plants and seeds. Returning to Philadelphia to prepare for his expedition, he set out for Charleston the following March. A year later, he arrived in Florida, spending most of the following year in travels up the San Juan, and across the northern portion of the peninsula. Following further expeditions in the Carolinas and Georgia, William returned to Kingsessing in January, 1777, and was able to spend several months with his father before the elder Bartram died that September.

It was not until 1791 that William's Travels through North & South Carolina, Georgia, East & West Florida, the Cherokee Country, the extensive territories of the Muscogulges, or Creek Confederacy, and the country of the Choctaws was published, and by that time other botanists, principally André Michaux, had published their own works, receiving credit for the naming of plants originally discovered by William.

He spent his remaining years tending to the gardens his father had established, which had been left, though, to his older brother, John, and then to his niece, Ann, and her husband. William died in the garden on the morning of July 22<sup>nd</sup>, 1823.

### ABOUT THE ACTOR

J.D. SUTTON was raised in the historic Germantown section of Philadelphia, and grew up with an abiding interest in the people and events of our nation's early years. He has enjoyed a professional career ranging from regional theatre to cabaret and dinner theatre productions, and rôles ranging from "Sidney Bruhl" in Deathtrap (which he has also directed) to "Victor" in Noel Coward's Private Lives and Jerry/Daphne in Sugar!, the musical version of Some Like It Hot. Mr. Sutton also appeared in the world-premiere production of Mark Brown's The Trial of Ebenezer Scrooge, doubling as both "Marley" and "Cratchit." Favorite parts include "Angus" in The Drawer Boy, "Don Quixote" in Man of La Mancha, "Scrooge" in A Christmas Carol, and the title rôle in Sherlock Holmes.

Mr. Sutton has appeared in a variety of television projects, including Tom Hanks' HBO series From the Earth to the Moon, and was featured in the title rôle of the independent film Farmer McAllister's Thinkin' Machine, which was honored as the "Best Comic Short Film" at the 2001 Atlantic City Film Festival. In addition, he has appeared in a variety of industrial training films for several major corporations and trade groups.

Mr. Sutton's solo play about Thomas Jefferson, Twilight at Monticello, has been presented off-Broadway and at venues throughout "the original 13", including Philadelphia's historic Carpenters' Hall. An hour-long version, sponsored by the Florida Humanities Council, has been performed at libraries and historic societies throughout the state. His half-hour A Brief Encounter with Thomas Jefferson was selected for FHC's 30th anniversary Chautauqua tour of eight communities, and was later reprised for presentations by the Florida Center for Teachers, sponsored by the U.S. Department of Education and the National Endowment for the Humanities.

A new solo play about 18th century botanist, explorer and artist William Bartram, *Bartram's Travels*, was recently a featured performance at the Great Smoky Mountain Wildflower Pilgrimage. Mr. Sutton has also appeared at Historic Bartram's Garden in Philadelphia.

Mr. Sutton and his wife, Amy (who is also the play's costumer) share their Central Florida home with their "furry children," all of which are rescued.

### NOTES

In the 230 years since William Bartram traveled in Florida, the names of several of the places he visited or traveled through have changed.

- Alachua Savanna: Now Payne's Prairie, covering about 20 square miles south of Gainesville, in Alachua County.
- "Battle Lagoon": Now Stagger Mud Lake, on the west side of the St.
  John's River, just above Lake Dexter. William camped at what is now
  known as Idlewilde Point, opposite Dexter Island.
- Cuscowilla: A Seminole town near the northwestern corner of Tuscawilla Lake, located about one-quarter mile east of present-day Micropy, in Alachua County. This was the town of the Seminole chief ber.
- Last Florida: The part of present-day Florida located east of the Apalachicola River. West Florida extended west from the Apalachicola, continuing along the Gulf Coast to the Mississippi.
- Mount Hope: Now Beechers Point, at the northern end of Little Lake George
- River San Juan: Now the St. John's River, extending more than 300 miles from near the southernmost part of Indian River County north to the Atlantic Ocean.
- Spalding's Upper Store: Located at the present-day site of Astor, in Lake County, this was one of a number of trading houses operated by the partnership of Spalding and Kelsall.
- Six Mile Spring: Now Salt Spring, arising just east of Lake Kerr, in Marion County, and flowing into Lake George. William's descriptive imagery of the spring is generally considered as the influence for the fountain described in Coleridge's poem, Kubla Khan.

Similarly, some of the words used by William may be unfamiliar, or their meanings have changed.

- Fusee: A smooth-bore musket, similar to a lighter-weight British
   "Brown Bess," capable of firing either ball or shot. Also called a fusil or fine.
- Uncium: A term William uses to denote both the purple and yellow anise, a genus of aromatic shrubs or trees. At Six Mile Spring, he is describing the yellow anise (I. parviflorum).
- Trout: The word used by William for the large-mouthed Bass, this
  species is still commonly called "trout" in the southeastern states through
  which William traveled.
- Water Lettuce: A word used by William to describe Pistia stratiotes, which he saw near the "Battle Lagoon," as "excellent haunts for trout."

We were each given a worm to look at and study while she was speaking. Earthworms are animals. She raises Red Wiggler Worms. Worms can be either sex or both. How to make a worm bed - You need a box or container 1 foot deep. 1 foot wide. 2 feet long. Put drain holes in the bottom then a piece of screen. You put ripped up old newspaper in the bottom then fill 3/4 full with leaves and put a couple of handuls of dirt or potting soil on top. You need about 36 worms to start your bed. You can feed your worms all kinds of garbage like banana peels, lettuce, tomatoes and cabbage. You feed your worms once a week and you put the food in a different spot each time you feed them. You do not give them meat, oils, bone or dairy products. Harvest worms in about 3 months. The soil is dark and is great for your garden.

Question - How many segments are on your worm?

Activities for which these funds can be used include:

1. Provision of Facilities for Pedestrians and Bicycles

2. Acquisition of Scenic Easements and Scenic or Hostoric Sites

3. Scenic or Historic Highway Programs

4. Landscaping and Other Scenic Beautification

5. Historic Preservation

- 6. Rehabilitation and Operation of Historic Transportation Buildings, Structures or Facilities
- 7. Preservation of Abandoned Railway Corridors (including conversion for pedestrian/bicycle trails).

8. Control and removal of Outdoor Advertising

9. Archaeological Planning and research

10. Mitigation of Water Pollution due to Highway Runoff.

Minnie advises purchasing azaleas while stock is in bloom so that color choice may be made. Do not fertilize azaleas until after bloom. Fertilize amarillas every ten days until show of color, then stop. Resume feeding after bloom is finished. Cut back poinsettias in Spring to 12'' - 14".

Minnie demonstrated how to plant a small potted plant into a larger pot.

(1) Fill larger pot with good potting soil. (2) Push small pot into soil forming a planting hole. (3) Remove plant from small pot and set in depression made in larger pot. (4) water. (5) Fill with more soil as needed when plant settles.

RE: PROPOSED COMMUNICATION TOWER
U.S. 41 in Floral City

WHAT: a 190 foot concrete monopole communication tower ( will look similar to a tall electric pole). It will have a fence topped with 2 feet of barb wire. The fence area will be xeriscaped and there is a requirement to maintain the landscaping. The tower will be painted light blue. LOCATION: Lot on north side of Cemetery (where the Ferris Sign is now) ORDINANCE: This U.S. 41 lot is zoned GENERAL COMMERCIAL. Currently a 150 foot monopole may be built there WITHOUT a "conditional use" (a variation to the code). They are also asking for an exception to building within the 500 foot radius of an historic site: i.e. the cemetery and the Ferris Grove Office building. (These are historic locally but are not termed "historic" by the state Historic Resources Division because neither are eligible for the National Register of Historic Places on their own. They (Bell South & ATT) are asking for an exception, therefore public comment is required.) ADDITIONAL: This will be the first tower of this kind to be built in Citrus County. These towers may be built 1.500 feet apart on commercial property.

EXAMPLE RESPONSE: Although I recognize the need for improved communication towers, it is important to me that these structures not detract from the rural, historic setting which is the entrance to Floral City's National Historic District.

Whenever previously constructed high rise structures exist, these should be utilized. For example, there are two water towers (north and south of this site) that could be used in place of a separate tower. Or the tower could be placed adjacent to the water tower consolidating towers.

- Greens: 2 at least 24" long and 4 18" long for design. Example: juniper, cedar, canna, hosta, croton, podicarpus, azalea or fern. There are many others to choose from.
- Five flowers with long stems. Ex.: chrysanthemums, carnations, etc.

- 8. gives successor all materials related to chairmanship

Awards All Awards Chairmen should be knowledgeable concerning awards offered by NCSGC, Deep South and FFGC; be able to interpret rules, descriptions and point scores and be capable of advising members as to procedures, deadlines, new awards and award changes. Also:

- 1. study awards offered in current Book of Information
- decide, with assistance of committee members and club or circle officers, which awards apply to their activities
- 3. secure desired applications from District Awards Chairman
- 4. assist committee chairmen in preparing Books of Evidence
- 5. send Books of Evidence to proper persons by required dates
- 6. visit Awards Room at Convention pick up entries at specified time to return to club
- publicize winners
- 8. urge club to plan for next year

Birds: Organized in 1933 by National Council, this longstanding committee provides members and the public with an incentive to protect birds and promote their preservation as part of the conservation program. The Chairman:

- 1 coordinates activities with
- (a.) Audubon Society and other ornithological organizations
- (b.) legislative and conservation committees
- 2.. supplies club chairmen with program guidelines
- 3. promotes establishment of bird sanctuaries

Butterfly Conservation: This committee was organized \*FFGG\* in 1979 and has since been incorporated into the Nation. Council and Deep South programs. The Chairman:

- 1. creates an awareness of need for butterfly conservation
- encourages membership to: (a.) learn stages of butterfly and its larvae. (b.) determine nectaring of foods and plant butterfly gardens. (c.) publicize value of butterflies in plant pollination

Civic Development: may be any project which improves the community aesthetically or environmentally. In 1961, NCSGC added this chairmanship to its roster. However, garden clubs at the local level have always assumed this responsibility. The Chairman.

- creates an awareness of the various aspects of civic development - conservation, roadside development, litter and pollution control, landscape design, legislation - and incorporates these committees as needed in the planning and execution of projects
- 2. provides material for programs and/or workshops
- 3. helps clubs and circles as requested
- 4. urges application for awards
- 5. emphasizes publicity for achievements

Historian: A record of Garden Club happenings should be kept for posterity. The Chairman....

- checks minutes of meetings, committee reports, The Florida Gardner and the National Gardener for activities
- 2. attends as many functions as possible taking notes
- 3. prepares reports as directed

Historic Preservation: 1976 - America's bicentennial year - marked the beginning of this committee concerned with the preservation of historic landmarks. Garden club members aid in the preservation of the flora and fauna relative to those areas. The Chairman ... 1. determines with club, possible sites for preservation.

- 2. urges clubs and circles to contribute to community proje-
- provides for information and/or procedures for registering historic projects as requested

## Chairmen's Duties (Continued)...

Membership: The membership committee is concerned with the growth of established clubs and circles and organization of new ones. The Chairman:

- promotes membership increases by clarifying FFGC policies and encouraging better understanding of the advantages and services available through FFGC membership
- suggests clubs use FFGC Bylaws, the Book of Information, The Florida Gardner and The National Gardner
- 3. keeps record of additions and or resignations of club

Native Plants and Wildflowers: This committee provides information on native plants and wildflowers with emphasis on preservation. The Chairman:

- 1. is alert to infringements upon boundaries of preserved areas
- 2. keeps abreast of legislation
- 3. publicized endangered list
- 4. plans programs to aid in preservation
- cooperates with related committees Conservation and Roadside Development

Roadside Development: This committee, a part of NCSGC since 1929, is concerned with activities relating to improvement of conditions along roadsides. It is thus closely allied to Pollution and Litter Control (In our club, it includes the Adopt A Highway Program). In 1974, the addition of Operation Wildflower to the NCSGC Board gave a new dimension to its scope of activities. The Chairman:

- 1. promotes cleanup and beautification campaigns
- 2. encourages preservation of native plant materials
- 3. strives for pesticide and billboard control
- 4. cooperates with state and local officials
- 5. keeps abreast of legislation governing any related issues
- coordinates activities with other committees Civic Development, Conservation, Landscape Design, Litter, Reclamation and Recycling, Legislation.

Trees: "Protect, plant and preserve for overall conservation."

This theme of the tree committee emphasizes the importance of trees to our existence and to the environment. The Chairman:

- 1. encourages tree planting
- urges observance of Arbor Day (adopted in 1932 by NCSGC as an annual event);
- 3. cooperates with State Department of Forestry
- 4 coordinates activities with related committees Civic Development, Conservation, Landscape Design, School Ground Improvement. (Fla Arbor day - 3rd Friday in January)

World Gardening: This committee was created by NCSGC in 1959 for the purpose of establishing friendship through gardening and the cultivation of plants for food. The Chairman:

- promotes contributions to foundations whose programs further, by means of gardening and related activities, improvement to health, education and economic welfare of underprivileged areas
- provides club with information and materials relative to these institutions
- 3. directs procedures for giving aid

Youth Activities (Junior Gardeners): the oldest of all the youth groups, was adopted by FFGC in 1931 and by NCSGC in 1931. It is designed for children from kindergarten through 6th grade. Both Intermediate and Junior Gardner units must be sponsored by a federated garden club and may be combined with other groups within the specified age level. It is suggested programs incorporate FFGC objectives such as birds, gardening, flower arranging, litter control, field trips and conservation.

Wekiva Youth Camp: FFGC's Wekiva Youth Camp, located in Wekiva Springs State Park, was developed as a cooperative effort by FFGC and the Florida Department of Natural Resources, Division of Recreation and Parks. The camp is self-supporting and nonprofit.

Schedule includes six weeks each summer for boys and girls who have completed grades 3 through 8.

Program is oriented towards nature study, but includes crafts, swimming and other sports.

Staff is composed of adult volunteers, college and high school counselors and invited specialists.

#### Wekiva Youth Camp (continued)

The Chairman:

- 4. urge members to provide camperships
- 5. coordinate camper applications
- 6. encourage donations
- 7. secure information re registration, scholarships, etc., from FFGC Chairman.

## Gardening Tips

Sometimes high humidity causes granulated plant food to barden in its container. If you place a piece of bread in the container, replace the lid, and leave the container closed for a day or two, the hardened plant food will again become grandular.

- · Try mothballs
