
#### Protect civic beauty

FCGC Members take pride in helping our town reflect its name working hard to keep the "floral" in Floral City through downtown roadside plantings, potted plants outside businesses, the Bird and Butterfly Garden along the bicycle trail, and the Memorial Garden outside the library.





FCGC annually awards good landscape designs with a yard sign for the best Yards of the Year to encourage members and the public to explore and incorporate landscape design techniques in their gardening.





Membership involvement in preparation of floral designs for various functions and to display in the public library as well as the Standard Home Flower Show [held in the Spring of 2000] advances the understanding and education of members and the community about the art of floral design. On-going support of this goal is achieved through attendance at other local and state garden club flower shows.

#### Advance the study of Horticulture



In 2005 FCGC instituted a pre-meeting Horticulture Q&A period. This offers members and guests an opportunity to learn about specific plants and/or problems they encounter. In addition programs often focus on plant specific horticulture or more general information related to propagation, pruning, pest management, etc.

An annual scholarship is awarded to a high school senior or college student majoring in some aspect of horticulture.

Our Grow and Share program gives members/guests an opportunity to offer information along with cuttings, seeds, bulbs, tubers they bring for free exchange.



#### Advance the fine art of gardening

FCGC established and maintains 5 gardens [Birds and Butterfly Garden, Gateway Garden, Memorial Garden, Rose Garden and School Garden] for the enjoyment of the community and offer gardening related programs open to the public at our regular meetings as well as during our annual Plant Sale.



#### Encourage improvement of roadsides and parks

FCGC participates in the Adopt-a-Highway program for roadside clean up. We work with the county to maintain and replace trees in our town. We make donations to individuals and groups developing and/or improving parks and trails.



### Cooperate with other organizations in the furtherance of these objectives through activities of our own club

Adopt-a-Highway project, Memorial Tree program, Junior Gardener program at Floral City Elementary, Heritage Council's Heritage Days in December, Memorial Garden at the Library, Bird & Butterfly Garden on the Withlacoochee State Rails to Trails bicycle trail.





#### d. School Garden:

- The planting and upkeep of School Garden and enlists the assistance of other club members as needed.
- Maintain a list of committee members and volunteers who worked for this committee and provide it to the Awards Chairman by April

#### e. State Trail Bird & Butterfly Garden:

- Maintain the Butterfly Garden on the Trail with native plants.
- Maintain a list of committee members and volunteers who worked for this committee and provide it to the Awards Chairman by April

#### Grow & Share



This is responsible for plants donated by members to be shared and the chairman should:

- Schedule the months when grow and share will be held
- Provide and prepare a table for grow & share using a plastic table cloth prior to each scheduled meeting
- · Encourage members to bring and label plants donated
- Clean-up and dispose of or donate left over plants
- Maintain a list of committee members and volunteers who worked for this committee and provide it to the Awards Chairman by April

- Maintain a list of committee members and volunteers who worked for this committee and provide it to the Awards Chairman by April


#### & Photography Committee

#### Horticulture Committee

# Junior Gardeners & Youth Activities Committee

This is the oldest of all youth groups. It was adopted by FFGC in 1931 and by NGC in 1931. It is designed for children from kindergarten through the 6<sup>th</sup> grade. Both Intermediate and Junior Gardner units must be sponsored by a federated garden club and may be combined with other groups within the specified age group. The Chairman should:

· Teach Junior Gardeners and incorporate FFGC objectives such as birds,



- gardening, flower arranging, litter control, field trips and conservation.
- Urge Junior Gardeners to present a program to the Garden Club on what they've
- Coordinate with the Horticulture Committee, Tree Committee, Wildflower and Native Plant Committee on programs related to school ground beautification.
- Establish and coordinate the activities of the Wekiva Youth Camp Sub-Committee
- Maintain a list of committee members and volunteers who worked for this committee and provide it to the Awards Chairman by April
- Wekiva Youth Camp Sub-Committee: FFGC's Wekiva Youth Camp, located in Wekiva Springs State Park, was developed as a cooperative effort by FFGC and the Florida Department of Natural Resources, Division of Parks & Schedule includes six weeks each summer for boys and girls who have completed grades 3 through 8. Programs are oriented toward nature studies, but include crafts, swimming and other sports.
  - Selects campers from the Junior Gardeners who have actively participated during the year. Gets registrations, scholarships, etc., from FFGC Chairman.

Incorporates the facets of the Horticulture Committee into designing the home landscape. In addition, the committee shall select the winners from among those nominated by club members for the Yard of the Year award[s] as determined by the committee:

The Chairman should:

- Be knowledgeable regarding basic landscape design concepts that are environmentally sound, esthetically pleasing and promote resource conservation principles;
- Promote the use of landscape design principles among members and in community parks and other public sites.
- Presides over the Yard of the Year Awards
  - Solicits nominations
  - Selects a judging committee
  - Presents signs and certificates to awardees
- Maintain a list of committee members and volunteers who worked for this committee and provide it to the Awards Chairman by April

  - · Provide name badges as needed,
  - Suggest use of FFGC Bylaws, the Book of Information, The Florida Gardner and The National Gardner.
  - Record all additions, resignations and/or non-renewals of club members.
  - Maintain a list of committee members and volunteers who worked for this committee and provide it to the Awards Chairman by April for the Awards Banquet in May

#### Publicity Committee



Is concerned with club recognition. The Chairman is responsible for

- Preparing and coordinating the publication of articles concerning club activities or events in local newspapers and The Florida Gardner Magazine.
- Maintain a list of committee members and volunteers who worked for this committee and provide it to the Awards Chairman by April

#### Publishing Committee



The publishing committee was formed in 2005 to assist the board [officers and committee chair] with its publishing needs:

#### Concerns Committee

  - Keep abreast of legislation governing any related issues, coordinate activities with other committees: Landscape Design, Wildflowers and Native Plants.
  - Maintain a list of committee members and volunteers who worked for this committee and provide it to the Awards Chairman by April

\* A part of NGC since 1929 is concerned with activities relating to improvement of conditions along roadsides. It is closely allied to Pollution and Litter Control [in FCGC, it includes the Adopt a Highway Program] and thus all club members are part of this committee. In 1974, the addition of Operation Wildflower to the NGC Board gave a new dimension to its scope of activities.

#### Scholarship Committee



This committee was established in 2003. The Chairman should:

- Solicit and review applications for the FCGC Scholarship to award to a high school senior or college student majoring in some aspect of horticulture.
- Award Camp Wekiva Scholarships to two Junior Gardeners with good attendance who demonstrated outstanding conduct, cooperation and enthusiasm at meetings throughout the year.
- Maintain a list of committee members and volunteers who worked for this committee and provide it to the Awards Chairman by April

#### Telephone Committee



Advises members of club needs and/or unpublicized events when their attendance or help is needed. The Chairman should:

- Assign non-email members to an email member as a telephone buddy and maintain an updated Email/Phone buddy list.
- Assign committee members to cover email buddy's vacation or other absence by calling their telephone buddy as needed.
- Investigate bounced email problems
- Maintain a list of committee members and volunteers who worked for this committee and provide it to the Awards Chairman by April

#### Tree Committee

#### Procedures for Honoring Deceased Members

Part 8

**PROCEDURES:** It will be understood that when a funeral or service is held locally, Club activities will be approved by the family either directly or through the funeral home.

ACTIVE/INACTIVE (current) member in good standing:

- 1. Their name will be placed in Memorial Book on a full "In Memory Of" page noting date of birth and death and years of membership along with membership status: active, inactive, life member.
- 2. If a funeral/memorial service is held locally, Garden Club members attending the service will:
  - a. Sign the register as a club member
  - b. Sit together
  - c. If approved, have the Garden Club's "Floral Watercolor" placed with the other flower arrangements for

viewing during the service and picked up at a later time.

- d. If appropriate, the Club's "Flower Procession" will be used. This will consist of Club members going into the service as a group and individually placing a flower in the designated vase, then sitting together. Upon completion of the service, the flowers will remain unless there will be a graveside service. Each member will remove a flower from the vase and take them to the graveside and placed on the casket at the end of the grave service.
- e. If desired by the family, the Club Chaplain or other member will read/recite a garden poem or prose at the service on behalf of the Club.

**PAST CHARTER MEMBER** who served actively for a lengthy period of time but who due to illness or other extenuating reasons was unable to hold current membership:

- 1. Honored with a separate "In Memory of" page in the Memorial Book
- 2. If funeral/memorial service is held locally, Club members attending service will sign register as a Clumember and:
  - a. Club members will sit together.
  - b. The Club's framed watercolor may be used by the funeral home, if appropriate.
  - c. If appropriate, the Club's "Flower Procession" may be used.
- 3. A Certificate will be given to next-of-kin noting inclusion of deceased in Memorial Book and that donation is accepted in memory of the deceased.

**PAST MEMBER** of the Club: A certificate will be sent to next of kin informing them that the name of past member will be placed in the Memorial Book on a page containing the names of other past members.

SPOUSE / PARENT / SIBLING / CHILD of a current member: the club member will be sent a certificate of notification. The name of the member's loved one will be placed in the Memorial Book on a page designated for this purpose and that memorials will be accepted and recorded in the Memorial Book.

- 1. Club members attending the service will sign the register as a Club member.
- 2. Club members will sit together at the service.
- 3. If appropriate, for active spouses of a club member, the Club's framed watercolor may be placed at the service. The "Flower Procession" may be used for a spouse who was active in the Club.

MEMORIAL BOOK PAGES: There are three categories of pages for the Memorial Book:

- 1. "In Memory of': full page is used for donations of \$100.00 or more in memory of a deceased individual and a multiple listing page for donations of less than \$100.00
- 2. "In Honor of": full page is used for donations of \$100.00 or more to honor a living individual and the multiple listing page for donations of less than \$100.00.
- 3. "A Special Gift": full page is used for general donations for the Garden of \$100.00 or more and the multiple listing pages for donations of less than \$100.00.

#### **CATEGORIES:**

- 1. Active/inactive member in good standing.

**BACKGROUND:** The Floral City Community Memorial Garden was established in 1993 and dedicated in 1996 for the initial purpose of honoring deceased Garden Club members. The purpose soon expanded to include honoring all members of the Floral City Community and their loved ones.





#### **COMPLETED PROJECTS:**

#### School Beautification Project ~

- Phase I: The Garden FCGC assisted by volunteers from Camp E-Nini-Hassee created the first flower bed of a larger garden area project on Floral City Elementary School grounds. [2002-2003]. In 2004 additional shrub and tree plantings, a seating area and stepping stone path were added.
- Phase II: The Mural A large educational mural depicting native plants, wildflowers, birds and animals was painted by FCGC volunteers [2003 2005].

#### **Video Productions:**

- ▶ <u>Proper Pruning Techniques Video:</u> FCGC Member & Certified Arborist, Michael Harnden, demonstrated proper pruning techniques while club photographer, Gloria Uhl recorded it on video. The video was first shown to FCGC members at our February, 2003, meeting.
- Fechniques in Weeding, Edging & Garden Bed Expansion Video: One of our members volunteered to demonstrate these techniques and identify the best clothing and tools to use on a video [recorded by another member] to present as a program to the membership and guests. The Video was then stored in the club library and made available for new members or those who were not able to attend the meeting in which it was presented. 2002

Gateway Sign & Gardens: FCGC designed, created, landscaped and currently maintains the new garden that surrounds the "Historic Floral City" gateway sign that was installed and dedicated to the town by the Floral City Heritage Council. FCGC member & artist, Jo Ann Quackenbush, painted the artwork for the sign and donated it to the town. Lettering for the sign was donated by H.D. & Lynn Bassett, and plants were donated by Frank & Phyllis Peters. The dedication ceremony: Camp E-Nini-Hassee sang "America The Beautiful", No. 15 Green Team sang "God Bless America" No. 16 Benediction by Rev. Greg Wood, Minister, Floral City United Methodist Church, Commissioner Josh Wooten, Ossie & Marcia Beasley, Michael Harnden, Frank Peters, Project Chair Larry Liverman, Jo Ann Quackenbush, Thelma Noble, Fred Daniels, Commander, American Legion Post #225, Rev. Michael Thompson, First Baptist Church of Floral City, Joe Hughes, Commander, Honor Guard, VFW Post #7122 October 18, 2003

**FCGC Banner:** To make the Floral City Garden Club more visible in the community, a banner was purchased to display during regular business meetings and special events. November, 2003

FCGC Giant Christmas Card: FCGC member and artist, Jo Ann Quackenbush, painted the club logo on a folding 4' x 8' piece of plywood to create a giant Christmas card and donated it to the club to display during the holiday season to wish town residents and visitors Seasons Greetings from the Floral City Garden Club. The right side of the

card was left blank so it can also be changed as needed to use as a sign for special events such as the plant sale. December, 2003

Memorial Tree Campaign: Floral City is widely known for its "Avenue of Oaks", a half-mile long stretch of century old live oak trees, originally planted in 1884, which canopy the historic district along Orange Avenue. In order to preserve this heritage of our community, the FCGC is embarking on a campaign to have each existing tree carefully evaluated by a Certified Arborist and to replace trees, which have been lost due to disease or storms over the years. Individuals and community businesses will be given opportunity to purchase a sizeable tree in honor or in memory of a designated person or organization. FCGC will coordinate publicity, solicitation for donors, the selection and planting of trees. [2001]

Freedom Trees Dedication Ceremony & Parade: In recognition of National Garden Club's Freedom Tree Program, FCGC purchased 2 large live oak trees which were planted by Michael Harnden, Certified Arborist, and Frank Peters assisted by the Junior Gardeners. In celebration of Arbor Day and as a Memorial Tribute to 9/11, FCGC sponsored the Freedom Tree Dedication with Floral City's first ever parade assisted by the Floral City Heritage Council. 1/18/2003

<u>Club Library:</u> In keeping with National, State and Local Garden Club goals to advance education in the fields of horticulture, landscape design, gardening and FCGC constructed a library with books donated by members

Flower Show, Garden Tea & Arts & Crafts Fair: The entire club was involved in monthly workshops to learn how to make flower arrangements, grow specimen plants and put on a flower show. In the spring of 2001 we sponsored the Floral City Standard Home Flower Show with Garden Tea & Fair using the theme "A Peek At Our Past". [2001]

Memorial Gardens Restoration Project: Plants in the Memorial Garden which were damaged during a building-repainting project were replaced to return the garden to its original beauty. New benches were installed to provide safe seating to garden visitors to stop and rest in the shade. A new sidewalk replaced the stepping stone path to make the gardens more accessible and safe for visitors to enter. [2000]

Junior Gardeners Wildflower & Butterfly Garden: We helped the Junior Gardeners at Floral City Elementary School to make a Wildflower Butterfly Garden. [1999]

Wildflower & Butterfly Garden: Members instructed Junior Gardeners on how to plant a Wildflower Butterfly Garden @ Floral City Elementary through Junior Gardeners and provided the plants for it. [1999]

Plant the Town Project: The garden club participated in a community-wide project digging new gardens, making planters and planting plants to put "floral" back into Floral City. New gardens were created at the corner of Old Floral City Rd. & Orange Avenue, the Lighthouse, the Shamrock and under the Old Oak Tree between the Masonic Lodge and Memorial Gardens. [1999]

<u>Community Building Beautification Project:</u> FCGC members planted and maintained hedges & flower gardens in front of the Floral City Community Building from 1991 until 1998 when the Lions Club assumed responsibility.

Corner Flower Garden Project: The garden club created a garden @ Old Floral City Rd. & CR 48 [1998]

<u>Withlacoochee Trail State Park Beautification Project at Jeanette Gazebo Site:</u> For Floral City Heritage Council's Gazebo Project, FCGC members, assisted by a few volunteers from Heritage Council, planted 18 trees [10-65 gal size], 25 vines and 10 shrubs [all native] along the Withlacoochee Trail State Park. April 1997.

<u>Welcome Spring Project:</u> In 1991 FCGC volunteers planted Dogwood seedlings purchased from the Inverness Garden Club between the Live Oaks along the "Avenue of Oaks" to "Welcome Spring".

Avenue of Oaks Tree Replacement Project: Beginning with Citrus County's Project Pride in 1990 and over the next several years, FCGC volunteers planted 50 live oak trees provided by the county along the "Avenue of Oaks" in hopes that the live oaks will grow and eventually replace older trees that die or become damaged.

<u>Post Office Beautification Project:</u> In 1989 FCGC members planted flowering plants and shrubs at the Floral City Post Office. In 1990, on 20th anniversary of Earth Day, FCGC members replanted the gardens and continued to maintain them until 1997 when the P.O. assumed responsibility.

#### ON-GOING PROJECTS

**GARDENS:** FCGC maintains five [5] gardens throughout the year: hedges, lawns & flower beds and during the summer members volunteer to participate in the watering schedule

- ➤ <u>Memorial Gardens:</u> FCGC began development the Memorial Gardens in 1992 and dedicated it to the community on October 27, 1996. In conjunction with the Memorial Garden, a Book of Remembrance is maintained in the Public Library.
- **Gateway Garden** dedicated to the town in 2004
- > Rose Garden received from the Friends of the Garden Club in January, 2004
- > School Butterfly Garden: opened in 2003
- > State Trail Bird & Butterfly Garden

Scholarship Fund: In keeping with National, Regional, State and local Garden Club goals for support of education in the fields of botany, agriculture, horticulture and conservation, the FCGC has established a scholarship fund to be awarded annually to a Citrus County student planning to major in one of these fields. The first annual scholarship in the amount of \$500 was awarded in 2001.

<u>Christmas Project – Decorate the Town</u>: As FCGC's gift to the town, members make decorations and place them throughout the town ... Floral City Rails to Trails entry and oak trees down Orange Avenue the last weekend in November of each year.

Arbor Day Tree Planting: Arbor Day: Each year FCGC members join together for the Arbor Day celebration and plant a native tree either on the Withlacoochee State Rails to Trail bicycle path or maintain the trees planted by the Club along the Avenue of Oaks.

Camp Wekiva/Junior Gardeners: In keeping with National, Regional, State and local Garden Club goals to aid in the protection and conservation of natural resources FCGC has continued to sponsor children to Camp Wekiva since 1982. In 1988, FCGC began a Junior Gardeners after school group to teach children to appreciate and cultivate our natural resources as well as a practical appreciation of gardening techniques.

Adopt-A-Highway: In the fall of 1989 FCGC adopted a 2 mile stretch of highway 48 as a club project during Citrus County's Project Pride. Throughout the year, four or more highway clean-up days are held ... Garden Club members and others in the community participate

Heritage Days: Since it's inception in December 1992, FCGC has been supporting Heritage Council's Heritage Days. Each year Garden Club members conduct a road-side clean-up to prepare for Heritage Days, assist in lighting luminaries, volunteer to dress up in period costumes to Hostess the Tour of Homes in various historic homes throughout the city. In addition, members bake cakes and cookies for the cakewalk and/or cookie sale to raise funds for the club and to make a donation to the Heritage Council.

#### Fundraisers:

- Annual Plant Sale: Each spring FCGC hosts a plant sale for the community and schedules guest speakers throughout the day to teach everyone about Florida gardening topics [individual plant species, garden pest/weed control, proper pruning and fertilization techniques].
- Secret Garden Tour: Every other year FCGC invites the public to come on a Secret Garden Tour. Approximately 7 homes are chosen to be on the tour and different guest Artists are invited to display their work at one of the homes for the public to view. The first one was held October, 2003

#### **NEW PROJECTS**

Memorial Gardens Capital Improvement Project: In conjunction with the Town Center, FCGC will petition the BOCC for lime rock to place around the borders of the gardens and to place regulation park and picnic benches in addition to a water fountain and an electric outlet.

<u>Town Center Project:</u> To further the goal to advance the fine art of Landscape Design, FCGC will be assisting the Heritage Council by landscaping the new Town Center when plans are finalized and construction work is completed. [2005-2007]




The Hospitality Committee is chaired by the 1st Vice President who appoints committee members to serve refreshments on a volunteer basis at each regular scheduled business meeting.



#### Roadside Beautification & Environmental Concerns Committee



advises members of club needs and/or unpublicized events when their attendance or help is needed. The Chairperson should:






- provide club with information and materials relative to these institutions
- · direct procedures for giving aid.


- Coordinate FCGC Awards with National, Regional and State garden clubs;

  - Landscape Committee and the Publicity Committee for the Yard of the Year award certificates.



May be involved with or, with club approval, sponsor any project which improves the community aesthetically or environmentally. In 1961, NGC added this chairmanship to its roster. However, garden clubs at the local level have always assumed this responsibility. The Chairman should:



- Create an awareness of the various aspects of civic development –
  conservation, roadside development, litter and pollution control,
  landscape design, legislation and incorporates these committees
  as needed in the planning and execution of projects;
- Provide material for programs and/or workshops;
- Help clubs and circles as requested;
- Request publicity for achievements and awards.

#### Flower Show Committee

#### The Chairman should:

- Be knowledgeable of Flower Show procedures;
- Attend FFGC sponsored Flower Show training programs when possible;



- Hold workshops for membership participation; coordinate activities related to the preparation for and presentation of a Flower Show,
- Promote attendance at local flower shows.

#### Helping Hands Committee



- Transportation [to/from meetings, doctor appointments, pharmacy or store];

- Pet Care

#### DUTIES BOARD OF DIRECTORS



This committee will also provide names of members who are available to help other members with limited physical capabilities needing longterm assistance with similar chores for a fee [agreed upon between the parties involved]. Gardening in this category would also include mowing, edging, weeding and etc.

#### Historical Committee

The Historian should:



- Prepare and maintain a record [pictures and notes] of Garden Club happenings in a Scrapbook to be kept for posterity;
- Check minutes of meetings, committee reports, The Florida Gardner and the National Gardner for activities;
- Attend as many functions as possible taking notes;
- Prepare reports as directed;
- Advise the internet coordinator of articles to be included on the web site.

#### Horticulture Committee

This committee encompasses several facets: food gardens, hydroponics, indigenous plants, improved cultivators, indoor gardening, world gardening, soils, propagation, the role of birds and insects, choice of plants for specific environments plus good landscape design, ornamental plants and trees. The Chairman should:

- Possess a knowledge of Florida horticulture;
- Stress horticulture perfection at Flower Shows and horticultural exhibits:
- Encourage membership in plant societies; cooperate with related FFGC committees and local horticultural agencies.

#### Hospitality Committee



The Hospitality Committee is chaired by the 1st Vice President who appoints Hostesses to serve refreshments on a volunteer basis at each regular scheduled business meeting.

#### Internet Coordinator & Webmaster

Is concerned with developing and maintaining a FCGC Website with current information and events. The Chairman should:



- Receive all email correspondence for officers without access to the internet and notify the appropriate members or committee;
- Forward email to members online
- Print copies of email and present them at board and regular business meetings as applicable,
- Clear potential web site news and information with the appropriate committee.
- Maintain the www.nccentral.com/fcgc website with current information.

#### **DUTIES BOARD OF DIRECTORS**

Junior Gardeners & Youth Activities Committee



[The Board of Directors is made up of Officers and Committee Chairmen] This is the oldest of all youth groups. It was adopted by FFGC in 1931 and by NGC in 1931. It is designed for children from kindergarten through the 6th grade. Both Intermediate and Junior Gardner units must be sponsored by a federated garden club and may be combined with other groups within the specified age group. The Chairman should:

- Teach Junior Gardeners and incorporate FFGC objectives such as birds, gardening, flower arranging, litter control, field trips and conservation.
- Urge Junior Gardeners to present a program to the Garden Club on what they've done;
- Coordinate with the Horticulture Committee, Tree Committee, Wildflower and Native Plant Committee on programs related to school ground beautification.
- Establish and coordinate the activities of the Wekiva Youth Camp Sub-Committee
- Wekiva Youth Camp Sub-Committee: FFGC's Wekiva Youth Camp, located in Wekiva Springs State Park, was developed as a cooperative effort by FFGC and the Florida Department of Natural The camp is self-Resources, Division of Parks & Recreation. supporting and nonprofit.
  - Schedule includes six weeks each summer for boys and girls who have completed grades 3 through 8.
  - Programs are oriented toward nature studies, but include crafts, swimming and other sports.
  - Staff is composed of adult volunteers, college and high school counselors and specialists. The Chairman should:
  - Promote programs about Camp to create interest and understanding;
  - Seek volunteers for teaching staff;
  - Recommend counselors;
  - Urge members to provide campers;
  - Coordinate camper applications encourage donations;
  - Gets information regarding registrations, scholarships, etc., from FFGC Chairman.

Landscape Design & Yard Of The Year Award Committee



Incorporates the facets of the Horticulture Committee into designing the home landscape. In addition, the committee shall select the winners from among those nominated by club members for the Yard of the Year award[s] as determined by the committee:

The Chairman should:

- Be knowledgeable regarding basic landscape design concepts that are environmentally sound, esthetically pleasing and promote resource conservation principles;
- Promote the use of landscape design principles among members and in community parks and other public sites.

#### DUTIES BOARD OF DIRECTORS

#### Legislation & Historic Preservation Committee

[The Board of Directors is made up of Officers and Committee Chairmen] 1976 - America's bicentennial year - marked the beginning of this committee concerned with the preservation of historic landmarks. Garden club members aid in the preservation of the flora and fauna relative to those areas. The Chairman should:

- Determine with the club, possible sites for preservation;
- Urge clubs and circles to contribute to community projects;
- Provide information and/or procedures for registering historic projects as required.
- Study issues which threaten the environment and alert the membership;
- Keep abreast of the proposed legislation;
- Provide membership with information concerning these proposals;
- Urge members to inform legislators on matters vital to aims and objectives of the Federation.





Is concerned with expanding the gardening knowledge of the membership through available resources. The Chairman should:

- Prepare, publish and maintain a list of available gardening related literature publications, books and other resources sincluding but not limited to gardening and landscape software for PC's] from club members, the public library, the Florida Cooperative Extension Service and Web Sites that are available to club members;
- Coordinate and track the loaning and returning of literature, books or other resources between club members;
- Store and maintain books donated to or purchased by the Garden Club:
- Research answers to questions asked by officers or other members related to Garden Club owned/stored books.

#### Membership Committee



Is chaired by the 1st Vice President and is concerned with the growth of established clubs and circles and organization of new ones. Chairman should:

- Promote membership increases by clarifying FFGC policies and encouraging better understanding of the advantages and services available through FFGC membership;
- Schedules greeters for club gatherings to welcome guests and members:
- Ensure guests are introduced to the members;
- Make follow-up calls to guests and new members to answer any questions they have;
- Maintain and update name badges as needed,
- Suggest use of FFGC Bylaws, the Book of Information, The Florida Gardner and The National Gardner.
- · Record all additions, resignations and/or non-renewals of club members.



In 1974, the addition of Operation Wildflower to the NGC Board gave a new dimension to its scope of activities. The Chairman should:  • Promote cleanup and beautification campaigns; • Encourage preservation of native plant materials; • Strive for pesticide and billboard control; • Cooperate with state and local officials including, but not limited to Litter Control, Reclamation and Recycling Legislation; • Keep abreast of legislation governing any related issues, coordinate activities with other committees: Landscape Design, Wildflowers and Native Plants.

# Ways & Means Committee

Is concerned with building and replenishing the club treasury funds. The Chairman should:

- Come up with money making ideas and be responsible for all fund raising programs including the monthly raffle;
- Be responsible for the Ways & Means Table:
  - Order items to sell,
  - Set-up for meetings and other designated events.
- Report to the Treasurer all funds received totaled by category: raffle, ways & means table, plant sale or other fund-raising project.
- Provide items for gifts to guests and new members.
- Establish a sub-committee for the Annual Plant Sale:



- Plant Purchasing & Propagation Sub-Committee Is concerned with making plants available for club fund raising events coordinated with the Ways & Means Committee. The Chairman should:
  - Solicit volunteer committee members to coordinate the selection, purchasing and delivery of plants from wholesale nurseries to the plant sale location;
  - Urge club members to propagate Home Grown plants in a timely manner, so that plants are sufficiently rooted, in time to donation for plant sales and make available to club members any needed pots and/or soil for this purpose;
  - Coordinate the delivery and tagging all plants to be sold.
  - Is responsible for the removal and subsequent sale or donation of any unsold plants.

#### Wildflowers & Native Plants Committee

This committee provides information on wildflowers and native plants with emphasis on preservation. The Chairman should:

- Be alert to infringements upon boundaries of preserved areas;
- Keep abreast of legislation;
- Publicize endangered and invasive plant lists;
- Plan programs to aid in preservation;

#### **NEW PROJECTS**

School Beautification Project: FCGC assisted by volunteers from Camp E-Nini-Hassee created the first flower bed of a larger garden area project on Floral City Elementary School grounds. The project plans include a large mural, additional shrub and tree plantings as well as a seating area and stepping stone path. [2002 - ]

Secret Garden Tour & Fund Raising Project: In keeping with National, Regional, State and local Garden Club goals to advance the fine art of Gardening and Landscape Design, FCGC is holding its first Secret Garden Tour with Art, Music & Lunch on October 11, 2003. Open to the public.

Town Center Project: To further the goal to advance the fine art of Landscape Design, FCGC will be assisting the Heritage Council by landscaping the new Town Center when plans are finalized and construction work is completed. [2003?]

<u>Flower Show:</u> In Keeping with National, Regional, State and local Garden Club goals to advance the fine art of Flower Arranging, FCGC plans to hold a Standard Flower Show in the Spring of 2005.



#### **ON-GOING PROJECTS**

Pontilla: In keeping with National, Regional, State and local Garden Club goals to aid in the protection and conservation of natural resources, FCGC holds periodic Pontoon Flotillas and publishes a Field Guide for each boat, which depicts various plants and wildlife that will be encountered along the route. This tour enhances our appreciation of natural resources available in our area and educates members and the public about native vs. exotic plants and invasive plants. 2000 - present

<u>Scholarship Fund:</u> In keeping with National, Regional, State and local Garden Club goals for support of education in the fields of botany, agriculture, horticulture and conservation, the FCGC has established a scholarship fund to be awarded annually to a Citrus County student planning to major in one of these fields. The first annual

scholarship in the amount of \$500 was awarded in 2001.

<u>Christmas Project – Decorate the Town</u>: As FCGC's gift to the town, members make decorations and place them throughout the town ... Floral City Rails to Trails entry and oak trees down Orange Avenue the last weekend in November of each year.

Arbor Day Tree Planting @ Rails to Trails: Arbor Day: Each January FCGC members join together in this annual celebration to plant a native tree on the Withlacoochee State Rails to Trail bicycle path and/or maintain the trees planted by the Club along the Avenue of Oaks.

Annual Spring Plant Sale Fund Raising Project: In keeping with National, Regional, State and local Garden Club goals to advance the fine art of Gardening and Horticulture, each Spring FCGC holds their annual plant sale and either conducts classes for the public on chosen gardening or horticulture topics; or invites county services to have a booth to educate the public on various topics such as aquatic weed control, invasive plants, proper fertilization and garden weed control and etc.

Camp Wekiva/Junior Gardeners: In keeping with National, Regional, State and local Garden Club goals to aid in the protection and conservation of natural resources FCGC has continued to sponsor children to Camp Wekiva since 1982. In 1988, FCGC began a Junior Gardeners after school group to teach children to appreciate and cultivate our natural resources as well as a practical appreciation of gardening techniques.

Memorial Gardens ~ Community Building ~ Library: FCGC began development the Memorial Gardens in 1992 and dedicated it to the community on October 27, 1996. Throughout the year designated members maintain hedges, lawns & flower beds and during the summer members volunteer to participate in the watering schedule.

Adopt-A-Highway: In the fall of 1989 FCGC adopted a 2 mile stretch of highway 48 as a club project during Citrus County's Project Pride. Throughout the year, four or more highway clean-up days are held ... Garden Club members and others in the community participate

Heritage Days: Since it's inception in December 1992, FCGC has been supporting Heritage Council's Heritage Days. Each year Garden Club members conduct a road-side clean-up to prepare for Heritage Days, assist in lighting luminaries, volunteer to dress up in period costumes to Hostess the Tour of Homes in various historic homes throughout the city. In addition, members bake cakes and cookies for the cakewalk and/or cookie sale to raise funds for the club

and to make a donation to the Heritage Council.

Annual Plant Sale: Each spring FCGC hosts a plant sale for the community and schedules guest speakers throughout the day to teach everyone about Florida gardening topics [individual plant species, garden pest/weed control, proper pruning and fertilization techniques].

Rails-to-Trails Butterfly Garden: Throughout the year FCGC volunteers maintain a butterfly garden that we established on the Withlacoochee Trail, complete with bird feeder and birdbath.



#### **COMPLETED PROJECTS:**

Techniques in Weeding, Edging & Garden Bed Expansion Video: One of our members volunteered to demonstrate these techniques and identify the best clothing and tools to use on a video [recorded by another member] to present as a program to the membership and guests. The Video was then stored in the club library and made available for new members or those who were not able to attend the meeting in which it was presented. 2002

Memorial Tree Campaign: Floral City is widely known for its "Avenue of Oaks", a half-mile long stretch of century old live oak trees, originally planted in 1884, which canopy the historic district along Orange Avenue. In order to preserve this heritage of our community, the FCGC is embarking on a campaign to have each existing tree carefully evaluated by a Certified Arborist and to replace trees, which have been lost due to disease or storms over the years. Individuals and community businesses will be given opportunity to purchase a sizeable tree in honor or in memory of a designated person or organization. FCGC will coordinate publicity, solicitation for donors, the selection and planting of trees. [2001]

Freedom Trees Dedication Ceremony & Parade: In recognition of National Garden Club's Freedom Tree Program, FCGC purchased 2 large live oak trees which were planted by Michael Harnden, Certified Arborist, and Frank Peters assisted by the Junior Gardeners. In celebration of Arbor Day and as a Memorial Tribute to 9/11, FCGC sponsored the Freedom Tree Dedication with Floral City's first ever parade assisted by the Floral City Heritage Council. 1/18/2003

<u>Club Library:</u> In keeping with National, State and Local Garden Club goals to advance education in the fields of horticulture, landscape design, gardening and FCGC constructed a library with books donated by members

Flower Show, Garden Tea & Arts & Crafts Fair: The entire club was involved in monthly workshops to learn how to make flower arrangements, grow specimen plants and put on a flower show. In the spring of 2001 we sponsored the Floral City Standard Home Flower Show with Garden Tea & Fair using the theme "A Peek At Our Past". [2001]

Memorial Gardens Restoration Project: Plants in the Memorial Garden which were damaged during a building-repainting project were replaced to return the garden to its original beauty. New benches were installed to provide safe seating to garden visitors to stop and rest in the shade. A new sidewalk replaced the stepping stone path to make the gardens more accessible and safe for visitors to enter. [2000]

Junior Gardeners Wildflower & Butterfly Garden: We helped the Junior Gardeners at Floral City Elementary School to make a Wildflower Butterfly Garden. [1999]

Wildflower & Butterfly Garden: Members instructed Junior Gardeners on how to plant a Wildflower Butterfly Garden @ Floral City Elementary through Junior Gardeners and provided the plants for it. [1999]

<u>Plant the Town Project:</u> The garden club participated in a community-wide project digging new gardens, making planters and planting plants to put "floral" back into Floral City. New gardens were created at the corner of Old Floral City Rd. & Orange Avenue, the Lighthouse, the Shamrock and under the Old Oak Tree between the Masonic Lodge and Memorial Gardens. [1999]

Community Building Beautification Project: FCGC members planted and maintained hedges & flower gardens in front of the Floral City Community Building from 1991 until 1998 when the Lions Club assumed responsibility.

Corner Flower Garden Project: The garden club created a garden @ Old Floral City Rd. & CR 48 [1998]

Withlacoochee Trail State Park Beautification Project at Jeanette Gazebo Site: For Floral City Heritage Council's Gazebo Project, FCGC members, assisted by a few volunteers from Heritage Council, planted 18 trees [10-65 gal size], 25 vines and 10 shrubs [all native] along the Withlacoochee Trail State Park. April 1997.

Welcome Spring Project: In 1991 FCGC volunteers planted Dogwood seedlings purchased from the Inverness Garden Club between the Live Oaks along the "Avenue of Oaks" to "Welcome Spring".

Avenue of Oaks Tree Replacement Project: Beginning with Citrus County's Project Pride in 1990 and over the next several years, FCGC volunteers planted 50 live oak trees provided by the county along the "Avenue of Oaks" in hopes that the live oaks will grow and eventually replace older trees that die or become damaged.

Post Office Beautification Project: In 1989 FCGC members planted flowering plants and shrubs at the Floral City Post Office. In 1990, on 20th anniversary of Earth Day, FCGC members replanted the gardens and continued to maintain them until 1997 when the P.O. assumed responsibility.

Heritage Council in Heritage Days: We participated in and held a Granny's Garden --2 years, Garden Tea, Nature Craft Exhibit & Sale.

### FLORAL CITY GARDEN CLUB GOALS

#### Aid in the protection and conservation of natural resources



FCGC provides each new member with conservascaping and xeriscaping information distributed by the Cooperative Extension Service. Our Wildflower and Native Plants committee offers catalogs and support for members desiring to incorporate such plantings in their landscapes.



Suggestions and reminders for the three R's of recycling - Reduce, Reuse, Recycle - are included in the monthly gardening guides provided to members at each meeting. In addition, periodic programs present methods of various types of recycling.



The FCGC Junior Gardeners program encourages participants to think about and practice caring for our environment. Each year two or three Junior Gardeners receive scholarships from FCGC to attend Camp Wekiva.

#### Protect civic beauty



FCGC Members take pride in helping our town reflect its name working hard to keep the "floral" in Floral City through downtown roadside plantings, potted plants outside businesses, the Bird and Butterfly Garden along the bicycle trail, and the Memorial Garden outside the library.

#### Advance the fine art of landscape design



FCGC annually awards good landscape designs with a yard sign for the best Yards of the Year to encourage members and the public to explore and incorporate landscape design techniques in their gardening.

#### Advance the fine art of floral design



Membership involvement in preparation and presentation of the Standard Home Flower Show held in the Spring of 2005 advances the understanding and education of members and the community about the art of floral design. On-going support of this goal is achieved as members create and explain floral design arrangements they bring to meetings for monthly fundraiser and through attendance to other local and state garden club flower shows.

# Advance the study of Horticulture



An annual scholarship is awarded to a high school senior or college student majoring in some aspect of horticulture.

Monthly horticulture Q&A offer members and guests an opportunity to learn about specific plants and/or problems they encounter. In addition programs often focus on plant specific horticulture or more general information related to propagation, pruning, pest management, etc.

Our Grow and Share program gives members/guests an opportunity to offer information along with cuttings, seeds, bulbs, tubers they bring for free exchange. A monthly handout with tips for the month is provided at each meeting.

### Advance the fine art of gardening



FCGC established and maintains the Memorial Garden and the Birds and Butterfly Garden for the enjoyment of the community and offer gardening related programs open to the public at our regular meetings as well as during our annual Plant Sale.

### Encourage improvement of roadsides and parks



FCGC participates in the Adopt-a-Highway program for roadside clean up. We work with the county to maintain and replace trees in our town. We make donations to individuals and groups developing and/or improving parks and trails.

# Cooperate with other organizations in the furtherance of these objectives through activities of our own club



Adopt-a-Highway project, Memorial Tree program, Junior Gardener program at Floral City Elementary, Heritage Council's Heritage Days in December, Memorial Garden at the Library, Bird & Butterfly Garden on the Withlacoochee State Rails to Trails bicycle trail.

Town Center Project: To assist the FC Heritage Council, FCGC will provide volunteers to landscape the new Town Center when plans and construction are finalized.

# Instructions for Hostesses

#### Set-up:

- Make coffee
- Place the TIP can on the counter first.
- Place the napkins, plates, plastic-ware needed to serve everyone on the counter next.
- > Place the refreshments in the middle.
- > Arrange drinks and cups or glasses at the end of the counter.

Clean-up ... we are required to leave the kitchen the way we found it:

- > Dispose of left-over beverages and wash containers.
- Dump ice and rinse ice bucket
- Store unused cups, plates, napkins, plastic-ware, cream and sugar back in cardboard box and return it to the storage room.
- Wipe counters and sink





Adopt-A-Highway:

1989: we adopted a 2 mile stretch of highway 48 as a club project during Citrus County's Project Pride. Throughout the year, three or four highway clean-up days are held ... members and others in the community participate.



Club Library:

2002: In keeping with National, State and Local Garden Club goals to advance education in the fields of horticulture, landscape design, gardening and we constructed a library book case, painted by Carol Dyer, and filled with books, videos and brochures donated by members and organizations.

**Community Gardens:** FCGC has created many gardens and currently maintains five [5] throughout the year:

### Memorial Gardens & Labyrinth:

1956: a 5-year plan to landscape library grounds was adopted, became an ongoing project. 1993: it became the Memorial Garden. 1995: the labyrinth was completed, handmade stepping stones were added, as well as benches and birdbath and dedicated it to the community on October 27, 1996. 2000: plants damaged during a building-repainting project were replaced, new benches were installed and a new sidewalk replaced the stepping stones. 2002: a sign was placed in the arbor.

Gateway Garden & Sign 2003: We assisted in the sign lay-out design and created the garden that surrounds the "Historic Floral City" gateway sign. The artwork was donated by Jo Quackenbush, H.D. & Lynn Bassett donated the lettering and Frank & Phyllis Peters donated the plants. Michael Harnden planted the trees. The Floral City Heritage Council worked with the county to have the sign created.






### **School Beautification Project**

2005: We purchased new giant red bows to decorate the Avenue of Oaks.


# Decorate the Town: Giant Christmas Card:

# Community Gardens: Withlacoochee Trail State Park Beautification Project at Jeanette Gazebo

Site: 1997: In April, for Floral City Heritage Council's Gazebo Project, FCGC members, assisted by a few volunteers from Heritage Council, planted 18 trees [10-65 gal size], 25 vines and 10 shrubs [all native] along the Withlacoochee Trail State Park.

Community Gardens: Plant the Town Project: 1999: For Make-A-Difference Day: We participated in a community-wide project digging new gardens, making planters and planting plants to put "floral" back into Floral City. The gardens at the corner of Old Floral City Rd. & Orange Avenue was restored, new gardens were created at the Lighthouse, the Shamrock and under the Old Oak Tree between the Masonic Lodge and Memorial Gardens.



**Fundraisers:** A necessary function of the club is to raise money not only for its own expenses, but also for donations to worthy organizations such as Camp E-Nini-Hassee, The Nature Conservancy, The Audubon Society, for scholarships to students seeking higher education in the field of botany or horticulture, to send Junior Gardeners to Camp Wekiva and to purchase Arbor Trees each year which are donated to the community. 
### Garden Tea & Arts & Crafts Fair:

1999-2001 Monthly floral arrangement workshops, taught by Marcia Beasley & Marie Jones, included instructions on how to grow specimen plants and put on a flower show. The Standard Home Flower Show with Garden Tea & Art Fair using the theme "A Peek At Our Past" was held at the Historic Jont Knight home owned by Dave & Pam Bellman. Musicians Pete Hennings and Pete Price provided entertainment. Guests Artists and Crafters displayed their work. Jones created a Recipe Book of old fashioned desserts and prepared quantities of each for refreshment.

Annual Plant Sale: Each year, usually in the spring, FCGC hosts a plant sale for the community. Often organizations set up display booths and guest speakers are scheduled throughout the day to teach the community about Florida gardening topics [individual plant species, garden pest/weed control, proper pruning and fertilization techniques].


Secret Garden Tour: The first Secret Garden Tour with Art and Artist at each home and Luncheon with Music at the Floral City Community Building was held October, 2003 ... we ran out of food. 


### HOST:


2006: the name **Dorothy Clark Camp Wekiva Scholarship Award** was given in honor of the president who offered the first scholarship to Junior Gardeners.





### **TREES**

Trees: Arbor Day, Memorial Tree Campaign: Floral City is widely known for its "Avenue of Oaks", a half-mile long stretch of century old live oak trees, originally planted in 1884, the historic district along Orange Avenue. In order to preserve this heritage of our community, the FC Heritage Council had each existing tree carefully evaluated by Certified Arborist, Michael Harnden in 2001-2002. Arbor Day: FCGC using Arbor Day to replace trees, which have been lost due to disease or storms over the years. Individuals and community businesses will be given opportunity to purchase a sizeable tree in honor or in memory of a designated person or organization. Each year FCGC members join together for the Arbor Day celebration to purchase, for the community, a native tree[s] and plant it on the Withlacoochee State Rails Trail bicycle path, as replacement trees along the Avenue of Oaks or maintain the trees already planted by the Club.

# In Retrospect [Republished from the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Edition, 1982]

The first meeting of the Floral Garden Club was held in October of 1956. Ruth Blankenship was elected president that year with a roll of 15 members. The year books were hand written then. The project adopted was a 5 year plan to landscape the Library grounds. By 1958 the enrollment increased to 18, and sponsored by Mrs. G. T. Smith of Ocala, our club became a member of the Florida Federations of Garden Clubs. Ways and Means projects were the sale of Christmas Arrangements and a Whist Party. Edith Linz took over the presidency in 1959 and a Junior Garden Club was formed. The first flower show under club sponsorship was held May 21, 1960 and the "Theme" was "In the Beginning". In 1961 the membership had grown to 28 members who participated in a Bazaar and Flower Show at the Citrus County Fair in March. In April a Flower Show was held at the Floral City Community Building on the 21st and 22nd. April of 1962 with 35 members now on the roll the third Flower Show was sponsored, landscaping the Library grounds became an ongoing project. Stella Love became president and a fourth Flower Show was held in March of 1963. Floral arrangements were made and furnished to the Citrus Memorial Hospital. Lydia Steeves and Elva Jones joined the club and Garden Club Calendars were \$1.25. In April of 1963 the Florida Federation of Garden Clubs, District 5 meeting was hosted by the Floral Garden Club. The theme "Beauty is Where You Find It" was adopted for the fifth Flower Show, held on April 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> in 1964. Mrs. Ivan [Marie] Morris became president in the spring of that year. Under her leadership, the sixth and seventh Flower Shows were held. Members entered 6 dried arrangements in the Sumter County Fair in November 1967 and all won ribbons. Edna Johnson joined the club, the first Chaplain was appointed. Saluting the Flag became a part of each meeting. Flora Ballard was elected president for the 1967-1968 year and the Tenth Anniversary of our Federation was celebrated. On March 18, 1968 the eighth Flower Show was held at the home of Lola Fox and the Theme was "At Home with Lola". Sara Upp

served as president in 1969 and 1970. Community Beautification became the club project. A home of the month was selected for a citation as incentive and our club now boasted 53 members. The ninth Flower Show was held on December 12, 1969 at the home of Clara Walters. Arbor Day 1970 was celebrated by planting 5 edar trees between the library and Masonic building in Floral City. Doris Sawyer was appointed chairman of a committee whose function was to place an arrangement of flowers each month in the Library for the enjoyment of the community. At the December 1970 meeting a Gavel was presented to the president, a gift from Aline Pyle. A Bazaar and Style Show was held in March of 1971. Bernice Johansen, Margaret Danielson, Vera Patterson Miller and Willa Strauss joined our club in 1972. In May of 1973 Lola Fox turned the gavel over to Marie Morris who was elected to serve as president for the next 2 years. The Florida Federation of Garden Clubs Award in Class 6 Corsages was won by our club in 1974 for entries by Vera Patterson Miller and Marie Morris. A Grow and Share Day was sponsored on March 22, 1975. The people came to ask questions and select from among the free plants offered by club members. The project was offered as an incentive to beautify their property and community in carrying out the presidents theme of working, learning and sharing. 1976 was the Bi-Centennial year. A Flag pole was installed in front of the Community Building. April of that year brought us two awards in the Environmental Poster Contest—a Deep South First Place to Florence Katraba and a National First Place to Eleanor Bonifield. Among our other laurels for the year was a Citation from World Gardening for our participation in Care. In December we held a Tour of Homes: the library, the United Methodist Church and 4 homes were decorated with Christmas Theme. Margaret McLeod and Leila White became new members. Arbor day was celebrated on February 21, 1977 by planting 4 Arbor-Vitae at the Community Building. In 1978 we were asked to adopt the project of landscaping the entrance to the new Floral Park. We donated to the American Land Trust and became members of the Nature Conservancy. Our list of books donated to the Library in honor of deceased members and husbands continues to grow and covers a variety of subjects on Gardening as well as Trees, Birds and Conservation. 1979 brought us honors with a first place prize in the 4<sup>th</sup> of July Parade. President Marie Morris opened our first meeting in October of 1979 and our guest was Lori Lynn Sumlin who we sponsored to camp Wekiva that summer. Learning about Herbs was a art of each meeting. Work on the Park Entrance Landscaping in preparation for the dedication ceremonies, rimming and planting of the Community Building grounds and preparation for our May 16th Flower Sow at the home of Margo Crockett kept us quite busy during the next two years which ended with the election of new officers. October of 1981 was our first meeting with Margo Crockett, our new 2-year president, presiding. Workshops for the year included making new Christmas decorations for the Community Building, lessons on using dried material, starting seeds and preparing our spot for a wildflower garden at the park. We joined the Audubon Society and learned more about conservation. A course in Flower Arranging was given by Eleanor Bonifield, Marie Morris, Frances Simpson and Marie Jones with the proceeds donated to the treasure. course consisted of 5 lessons and 25 garden club members participated. A State Life Membership was presented to Eleanor Bonifield as part of a "This is Your Life" program at the December meeting. Two Certificates of Appreciation were presented to Marie Morris and Lydia Steeves for their years of service to the club. As we enter our 25<sup>th</sup> year, our membership is 58 and we continue to grow that we might live better.

We have been and continue to be active and involved in community improvement ... for the next 25 years and beyond, see the Projects List on the club website [www.floralcitygardenclub.com] or in the BOI section of the Yearbook.

Annuals are plants that complete their entire cycle in growing season. Some annuals when they are in Florida act as perennials—which are plants that live at least 3 years under local growing conditions.

Zinnias, petunias and marigolds are the most popular annuals, but SOME other annuals that can be planted in March/April are ageratum, aster, balsam, celosia, cone flower, cosmos, crotaleria, cypress vine, dahlias, floss flower, globe amaranth, gourds, morning glory, nasturtiums, rose moss, salvia, sunflower, and torenia.

New varieties are always being bred for disease resistance, size, color and flower shape. There are trial gardens all throughout the US to check the fitness of the new varieties and to recognize the outstanding ones. Those awarded are called All American Selections. There are some nurseries in Florida that are developing ecotypes of seeds that perform better in the hotter climate of Florida than the seeds gathered from a different climate.

Perennials can provide some beautiful cut flowers. Some that do well in vases are irises, daffodils (narcissus in Florida), roses, Shasta daisies and Gerbera daisies. Gather them early in the morning and have a bucket of tepid water to immediately immerse them in. Shears or a very sharp knife will help as you cut them at a 45% angle to promote water absorption. Later you can recut the stems and remove any foliage that will be below the vase water level. You can make a good preservative by mixing four heaping teaspoons of cane sugar with two tablespoons of white vinegar in a quart of warm water. Flowers should stay in the conditioner for an hour or two before arranging. Plant new perennials now before the summer heat begins.

Lawns have begun to grow again but weekly cutting might not be the best thing for them. Leaving the grass blades long enough to provide food for the roots in order to lengthen them will help your lawn stay healthy especially during a drought. The deeper the roots the better off the grass will be and the insects won't smell the chlorphyll that is produced when the cut grass starts growing frantically trying to provide food for its roots. Did you know that insects can smell chlorophyll and will attempt to reach it. Sometimes they are the harmful insects and sometimes they are the helper insects. If you have a photo of Florida's beneficial insects it will help you dertermine whether all the "bugs" that you see in your yard need encouragement or discouragement. You'll also know just how severe the discouragement should be. Too heavy usage of poisons certainly doesn't help the lawn or our environment.



Fertilize palms now if not already done. Use the formula that our Certified Tree Arborist gave us: In a five (5) gallon bucket add two (2) pounds of Epsom salts and 1/2 gallon white vinegar and fill with water. This can also be used for citrus and azeleas and for quick greening you can add 1 tsp. of Miracle Grow. Fertilize young trees and shrubs now

to encourage growth.

Good vegetables to plant now are snap beans, pole beans, lima beans, sweet corn, cantaloupe, eggplant, okra, pepper plants, pumpkin, summer squash, sweet potatoes, tomato plants, and watermelon.

Watch for aphids on all the new growth. They cause curled up misshapen leaves. Spray with soapy water or, if severe, spray with Diazinon.

Did you know?? A study revealed that the massive releases of midges (blind mosquitoes) from Florida lakes was due to ecological changes caused by pollution. Another good reason to encourage us to keep our soils and waters clean.

# FLORAL COTY GARDEN CLUB GARDENONG GUODE for May

Pests: At this time of year the pests are having a field day! Lubber grasshoppers are hatching out. Mole crickets are laying their eggs. Thrips as well as mealy bugs and spider mites are showing up on some of our favorite plants. One way to control thrips is to use a yellow sticky card or small yellow cup. You can coat a piece of yellow cardboard or yellow cup with oil or petroleum jelly. This color attracts them and the oil captures them. Check with the extension office for ways to defend your plants without using environmentally unsafe sprays or poisons. Libraries have books specifically dealing with problems in the garden.

Lawns: Check your lawn weekly for insect damage. You can also be checking to see if the blades of grass are rolling together or if you can see your footprints. This indicates that your lawn needs watering.

Spot treat problem areas in your lawn rather than spraying or applying total poisons. Spraying ten (10) feet around and through any infected area. When the grass has deep roots and is mowed no shorter than three and one-half (3 1/2") inches it is strong enough to resist most pests. Make sure that the mower blade is sharp. If dull the mower can pull the grass out of the ground.

Shrubs: Layer a deep mulch around gardenias to keep their roots cool and moist. They don't like to be dry while in bud and blooming. Check for lubber grasshoppers on them now. An entire bush can be destroyed by one hatching.

Mildew and sooty mold on crepe myrtles can occur if we have humid days and if there is poor circulation within the bush. Check pruning

days and if there is poor circulation within the bush. Check pruning guides specifically for crepe myrtles. Fungicides can help control both problems. Follow directions carefully.

Miscellaneous: Part of the enjoyment of having beautiful foliage and/or blooming plants is sharing a cutting or seeds with friends and neighbors. There are some families who have plants(or cuttings from plants) passed from great grand-parents. Some favorites are ferns (maidenhair or Boston), African violets, lemon verbenas(difficult to root, but worth it), hollyhocks and iris. You may know of many more.

**PROCEDURES:** It will be understood that when a funeral or service is held locally, Club activities will be approved by the family either directly or through the funeral home.

ACTIVE/INACTIVE (current) member in good standing:

### Lyme Disease<sup>1</sup>

Lyme disease was first documented in the United States in 1975. The organism that causes Lyme disease is transmitted by the bite of a tick. Lyme disease is named for the town in Connecticut where some of the first cases in the U.S. occurred. Lyme disease cases have since been documented in about 43 states, with over 2,000 cases annually. Several cases of Lyme disease have been reported in Florida.

The primary vectors of Lyme disease in the U.S. are thought to be the northern deer tick (Ixodes dammini) in the North and the black-legged deer tick (Ixodes scapularis) in the South. Other ticks are also known to transmit the disease. Lyme disease is maintained in wild rodent populations, on which the immature ticks develop. These immature ticks pick up the disease organism when they suck the blood of infected rodents. The adult ticks then look for a larger host, such as deer or humans, to get their final blood meal and transmit the disease when they feed.

#### SYMPTOMS

The first sign of Lyme disease in 60-80% of patients is a red circular rash around the puncture mark made where the tick pierced the skin. The most common shape of the rash is an oval 2-3 inches in diameter that usually lasts about 4 weeks. The rash does not itch but may feel warm to the touch. Flulike symptoms may also develop that often include aches, fever, fatigue, muscle pain, joint pain, and

headache. Arthritis, cardiac disease, and neurologic disorders may develop if the disease is not properly or promptly treated. Sometimes these more serious symptoms develop without the individual ever having a rash.

#### TREATMENT

Once diagnosed, Lyme disease can be treated. Physicians can determine if an individual has been infected by the Lyme disease organism using a simple blood test; however, some people test negative but have the disease. Infection can be treated by taking certain antibiotics. However, no immunity is conferred from infection so a person could get Lyme disease again from another bite of an infected tick.

Pets and other animals can contract Lyme disease as well, exhibiting symptoms similar to those in humans. Veterinarians can test for Lyme disease in pets and domestic animals exhibiting suspicious signs of arthritis (in younger animals), heart problems, or neurological signs.

#### **PREVENTION**

The best prevention against Lyme disease is to avoid being bitten by ticks. Individuals who spend a lot of time outdoors should be aware of the danger and make it a habit to regularly check their bodies for ticks. The tick requires time to attach itself and begin

feeding. It is possible to remove ticks before they are able to transmit the disease. Ticks should be grasped with tweezers at the point where their mouthparts enter the skin and pulled straight out with firm pressure. Immature ticks are small and difficult to detect; often they appear as a freckle or mole.

- Stay out of dense undergrowth unless absolutely necessary. Walk on closely mowed grass or paved walkways whenever possible.
- Wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants tucked into socks. Light-colored clothes make ticks more visible and easier to pick off.
- 3. Apply tick repellent to socks and shoes to prevent ticks from crawling onto clothing.
- Inspect yourself and others thoroughly after walking through areas suspected of being infested with ticks.
- When taking children on nature outings, keep them in a group with a leader who knows to avoid tick infested areas and can inspect them for ticks.

6. See a doctor if Lyme disease symptoms appear.

#### CONTROL

Recommendations for control of ticks include:

- Keep grass cut low to prevent ticks from developing.
- Discourage wild animals (raccoons, skunks, deer, mice, etc.) from coming around your yard. They often harbor the ticks which transmit Lyme disease.
- Area treatment with insecticides is not warranted in most cases. However, in some situations it might be appropriate to use insecticides for control of ticks. Check with your county extension office for current IFAS recommendations.

### Cold Protection of Ornamental Plants<sup>1</sup>

Winter temperatures in Florida are frequently low enough to cause cold injury to tropical, subtropical, and occasionally temperate plants not adapted to Florida climatic conditions. Tropical plants and summer annuals do not adapt or harden to withstand temperatures below freezing and many are injured by temperatures below 50°F (10°C). Subtropical plants can harden or acclimate (become accustomed to a new climate) to withstand freezing temperatures and properly conditioned temperate plants can withstand temperatures substantially below freezing. Freezing conditions occur annually in north and central Florida, while below freezing temperatures are rare for south Florida. Freeze probabilities for various locations in Florida are published in IFAS Bulletin 777, Freeze Probabilities in Florida.

Freezes can be characterized as radiational or advective. Radiational freezes or frosts occur on calm, clear nights when heat radiates from the surfaces of objects into the environment. These surfaces can become colder than the air above them due to this rapid loss of heat or long wave radiation. When the air is moist, a radiant freeze results in deposits of ice or frost on surfaces. Dry radiational freezes leave no ice deposits but can cause freeze damage. Plant damage from a radiational freeze can be minimized by reducing radiant heat loss from plant and soil surfaces.

Advective freezes occur when cold air masses move from northern regions causing a sudden drop in

temperature. Windy conditions are normal during advective freezes. Although radiant heat loss occurs during an advective freeze, the conditions are quite different from a radiational freeze. Plant protection during advective freezes is more difficult.

The ability of plants to withstand freezing temperatures is affected by temperature fluctuations and day lengths prior to a freeze. A gradual decrease in temperature over a period of time increases the ability of plants or plant parts to withstand cold temperatures. A sudden decrease in temperature in late fall or early winter usually results in more damage than the same low temperature in January of February. Short durations of warmer temperatures in midwinter can deacclimate some plants resulting in bud break or flowering. Deacclimated plants are more prone to freeze injury. Preconditioning of tropical plants to withstand chilling temperatures has not been well documented.

Cold injury can occur to the entire plant or to plant parts such as fruits, flowers, buds, leaves, trunks, stems or roots. Many plant parts can adapt to tolerate cold, but fruits and roots have little ability to acclimate or develop cold tolerance. Cold injury to roots of plants in exposed containers is a common occurrence and usually is not evident until the plant is stressed by higher temperatures. Leaf and stem tissue will not survive ice formation inside the cells (result of rapid freeze) but many plants can adapt to tolerate ice formation between cells.

One type of winter injury is plant desiccation or drying out. This is characterized by marginal or leaf tip burn in mild cases and totally brown leaves in severe cases. Desiccation occurs when dry winds and solar radiation result in the loss of more water from the leaves than can be absorbed and/or transported by a cold or frozen root system. Root systems in the landscape are seldom frozen in Florida, but potting media in small containers in north Florida can be frozen for several consecutive hours.

#### WHAT TO DO BEFORE THE FREEZE

Homeowners can take steps to help acclimate plants to cold temperatures and to protect plants from temperature extremes. These steps range from selection of a proper planting site to alteration of cultural practices.

#### **Planting Site Selection**

The microclimate of a location is determined by factors such as elevation, landform, surface reflectivity, soil properties, degree of canopy cover, proximity of structures or plants, and the general solar heat exchange model. Temperature fluctuation can differ from one location to another, even within a residential landscape. Thus, existing microclimates and/or possible modifications of microclimates should be considered when choosing the planting site for cold sensitive plants.

Tender plants should be planted in a site with good air drainage, and not in a low area where cold air settles. Arranging plantings, fences, or other barriers to protect tender plants from cold winds improves cold protection, especially from advective freezes. Poorly drained soils result in weak, shallow roots which are susceptible to cold injury.

#### **Proper Plant Nutrition**

Plants grown with optimal levels and balance of nutrients will tolerate cold temperatures better and recover from injury faster than plants grown with suboptimal or imbalanced nutrition. Late fall fertilization of nutrient deficient plants or fertilization before unseasonably warm periods can result in a late flush of growth which is more susceptible to cold injury. Plants in Florida landscapes should be fertilized four times per year. Landscape plants in north and north central Florida should be fertilized in March, June, September, and December. Plants in south and south central Florida should be fertilized in

February, May, August, and November. One to 1½ pounds (454 to 681 grams) of 6-6-6 or 8-8-8, or ½ pound (227 grams) of 12-4-8 or 16-4-8 should be applied per 100 square feet (9 square meters) of planting area for the first three applications per year. A decrease in the amount of fertilizer applied in the fall is necessary because plant nutrient consumption declines during the colder season. Plants grown in colder portions of the state require one-third to one-half the standard fertilization rate in the fall, and two-thirds the standard rate should be applied in the warmer sections of Florida.

#### Shading

Tree canopy covers can reduce cold injury caused by radiational freezes. Plants in shaded locations usually go dormant earlier in the fall and remain dormant later in the spring. Tree canopies elevate minimum night temperature under them by reducing radiant heat loss from the ground to the atmosphere. Shading from early morning sun may decrease bark splitting of some woody plants. Plants that thrive in light shade usually display less winter desiccation than plants in full sun. But plants requiring sunlight that are grown in shade will be unhealthy, sparsely foliated, and less tolerant of cold temperatures.

#### Windbreaks

Fences, buildings, and temporary coverings, as well as adjacent plantings, can protect plants from cold winds. Windbreaks are especially helpful in reducing the effects of short-lived advective freezes and their accompanying winds. Injury due to radiational freezes is influenced little by windbreaks. The height, density, and location of a windbreak will affect the degree of wind speed reduction at a given site.

#### Water Relations

Watering landscape plants before a freeze can help protect plants. A well watered soil will absorb more solar radiation than dry soil and will reradiate heat during the night. This practice elevated minimum night temperatures in the canopy of citrus trees by as much as 2°F (1°C). However, prolonged saturated soil conditions damage the root systems of most plants.

#### Other Cultural Practices

Avoid late summer or early fall pruning which can alter the plant hormonal balance resulting in lateral vegetative budbreak and a flush of growth. This new growth is more susceptible to cold injury.

Healthy plants are more resistant to cold than plants weakened by disease, insect damage, or nematode damage. Routine inspection for pests and implementation of necessary control measures are essential. Contact your County Extension Office for information on pest identification and recommended controls.

#### Methods of Protection

Plants in containers can be moved into protective structures where heat can be supplied and/or trapped. Containers that must be left outdoors should be protected by mulches and pushed together before a freeze to reduce heat loss from container sidewalls. Leaves of large canopy plants may be damaged if crowded together for extended periods.

Heat radiating from soil surfaces warms the air above the soil or is carried away by air currents. Radiant heat from the soil protects low growing plants on calm cold nights, while tall, open plants receive little benefit. Radiant heat loss is reduced by mulches placed around plants to protect the roots. For perennials, the root system is all that needs to be protected since the plants die back to the ground annually.

Coverings protect more from frost than from extreme cold. Covers that extend to the ground and are not in contact with plant foliage can lessen cold injury by reducing radiant heat loss from the plant and the ground. Foliage in contact with the cover is often injured because of heat transfer from the foliage to the colder cover. Some examples of coverings are: cloth sheets, quilts or black plastic. It is necessary to remove plastic covers during a sunny day or provide ventilation of trapped solar radiation. A light bulb under a cover is a simple method of providing heat to ornamental plants in the landscape.

#### WHAT TO DO DURING A FREEZE

Ornamental plants can be protected during a freeze by sprinkling the plants with water. Sprinkling for cold protection helps keep leaf surface temperatures near 32°F (0°C) because sprinkling

utilizes latent heat released when water changes from a liquid to a solid state. Sprinkling must begin as freezing temperatures are reached and continue until thawing is completed. Water must be evenly distributed and supplied in ample quantity to maintain a film of liquid water on the foliage surfaces. Irrigation for several days may water soak the soil resulting in damaged root systems and/or plant breakage due to ice build up. Consult Extension Circular 348, Sprinkler Irrigation for Cold Protection, for more technical information on this subject.

#### WHAT TO DO AFTER THE FREEZE

#### Water Needs

Plant water needs should be checked after a freeze. The foliage could be transpiring (losing water vapor) on a sunny day after a freeze while water in the soil or container medium is frozen. Apply water to thaw the soil and provide available water for the plant. Soils or media with high soluble salts should not be allowed to dry because salts would be concentrated into a small volume of water and can burn plant roots.

#### Pruning

Severe pruning should be delayed until new growth appears to ensure that live wood is not removed. Dead, unsightly leaves may be removed as soon as they turn brown after a freeze if a high level of maintenance is desired. Cold injury may appear as a lack of spring bud break on a portion or all of the plant, or as an overall weak appearance. Branch tips may be damaged while older wood is free of injury. Cold injured wood can be identified by examining the cambium layer (food conducting tissue) under the bark for black or brown coloration. Prune these branches behind the point of discoloration.

Florida homeowners enjoy a vast array of plant materials and often desire a tropical or semitropical appearance to their landscapes. Plants are often planted past their northern limit in Florida, although microclimates differ dramatically. Tropical and subtropical plants can be used effectively in the landscape, but they must be protected or replaced when necessary. A combination of tender and hardy plants should be planted in order to prevent total devastation of the landscape by extremely cold weather.

### Butterfly Gardening in Florida<sup>1</sup>

#### **Background**

Few outdoor activities are more rewarding and easily available than attracting butterflies to a well-designed butterfly garden. Creating a butterfly garden can be as simple as planting a windowsill box or as complex as landscaping many acres. To be successful in any situation, however, requires the correct choice of plants.

The total butterfly garden takes into account the food preferences of both adult butterflies and their caterpillars. Many butterfly species will drink nectar from a variety of flowering plants, but their caterpillars often are greatly limited in the number of plants on which they can feed. It is not necessary to plant larval food plants to attract butterflies, but adults tend to stay fairly close to the areas where their larval food plants can be found.

All of this requires planning. There are a few basic rules to follow. You can be as creative as you wish, but you must start with a plan that considers the requirements of the butterflies you wish to attract and the plants you will use to lure them.

Butterfly gardening is an exacting (not difficult) pursuit and must be based on butterfly preferences-not human ones. Luckily, butterfly and human favorites are mostly compatible.

#### **Butterfly Facts and Biology**

Of the 760 butterfly species that occur in North America, about 100 can be found in Florida. These do not include the skippers (of which Florida is home to an additional 70 species). Skippers, which are not listed in this publication, have relatively stout bodies and shorter wings than true butterflies. Moths are different from butterflies and skippers by having fluffy antenna instead of a club at the end. Other differences are that moths are active at night, and tend to hold their wings open while feeding or resting.

There are four stages in the amazing butterfly life cycle: egg, larva, chrysalis (resting), and adult. Butterfly eggs are laid on the larval food plant and caterpillars emerge within a few days. Some species overwinter in this stage. These larva have enormous appetites and do nothing but eat. When their skin is stretched as far as possible, they molt or shed that skin. After a few molts, they seek a sheltered place. Some spin a safety belt that holds them upside down on a twig or similar object, while others hang on with special hooks on their abdomen. At this time, the final molt takes place and the larva skin is replaced with a stiff butterfly chrysalis (pupa). During this stage, the once worm-like caterpillar transforms into a beautiful, flying adult.

#### **Butterflies**

Most adult butterflies found in Florida feed on flower nectar. Some visit a variety of flowers and others seem to prefer a more specialized menu. Butterflies generally are attracted to brightly colored simple flowers that are not too deep and that are wide enough for good perching platforms. Universal nectar favorites include: phlox, zinnias, asters, marigolds, daisies, coneflowers, black-eyed Susan, milkweeds, thistles, and butterflybush. Flowers in the composite family (e.g. daisies and asters) and flowers in clusters (e.g. milkweed and viburnum) also are good. Double-flowered varieties of cultivated flowers are never as good as the single ones.

White varieties are inferior to other colors as far as butterflies are concerned. A wide assortment of flowers is preferable to having just a few different kinds or a variety of similar flower types. As a rule, small butterflies nectar from small flowers and large butterflies nectar from larger ones. Flowers that produce the most scent generally furnish the most nectar. Nectar also should be available for the greatest number of months possible. Therefore, it is best to choose your flowers so that at least some of them are always blooming. Remember that many flowers are not designed to be pollinated by butterflies and are seldom, if ever, visited by them.

Adults of some butterfly species rarely visit flowers but instead are attracted to aphids, manure, rotting fruit, mud, or tree sap.

#### Caterpillars

Larval (caterpillar) food plants must be tailored to specific butterflies. Some plants are hosts to several different butterflies (e.g., passion vine), but often each species requires its own plant. So, unless you have acres of land at your disposal, you will have to be selective in your plantings for specific butterflies. You also must remember that these plants ultimately will be chewed on if you are successful.

Birds and other predators are quick to eat these larva so few reach adulthood or get large enough to do extensive damage. In fact, very few butterfly species (unlike moths) cause significant problems to vegetable gardens. Most feed singly or in small groups, as their eggs are laid. Most butterfly gardeners are quite pleased to share their carrots and dill for the pleasure of the company of black swallowtails; they simply plant some extra for the caterpillars. If you must use insecticides, use them sparingly as they are just as deadly to butterflies as they are to other insects.

#### **Planning Your Garden**

#### **Butterfly Basics**

You can't attract butterfly species that are not present naturally in your region, nor can you grow plants that aren't adapted to the soils and climate in your region of the state. Butterfly gardening should not try to improve nature but complement it as the best horticultural practices have always done. Follow these easy steps to plan your garden.

#### Your Butterfly Region Map

Look at the map provided (Figure 1) and determine the region in which you live.

#### Your Butterfly Region Table(s)

Then, look for your region in the Florida butterflies tables (Tables 1-9), highlight the species that occur in your area, and use habitats that can be found within 1/4 mile of the site you are considering for your butterfly garden.

Annuals




Bedding Plants. The garden centers have pansies and other cool-season bedding plants. Pansies, which can be planted through mid-February, are available in many bright colors to cheer up an otherwise dull winter garden.

Perennials



Indoor Gardening: Mist frequently [2x day] those potted plants brought indoors for protection from cold. Heated air often causes leaves to wither without proper moisture. Avoid drafts and vented areas where warm, dry air will directly contact them. Provide ample sunlight and water. When watering, take the plant to the sink, water well, allow excess water to drain, and then place it in a saucer to prevent damage to floors or furniture. Houseplants with large leaves and smooth foliage such as philodendrons, dracaenas, rubber plants, and other large-leafed houseplants a bath this month by gently washing the foliage on both sides with a sponge dipped in soapy water. Mild dish detergent works fine. This removes the grime and allows the pores of the leaves to breathe more freely. Bulbs: You can also try forcing some bulbs to bloom indoors. Most bulbs require a period of cold temperature before growing and blooming. Tulips and hyacinths that have been chilled for 6 weeks should be ready for planting in late December ... these bulbs won't do well the following year and should be treated as annuals. Two bulbs that don't require these conditions and are very easy to force indoors are Paperwhite narcissus and amaryllis. Simply plant these bulbs and water to enjoy their beauty and fragrance.

Lawns



Trees &

Shrubs



Trees and Shrubs. December is another ideal time to plant trees and shrubs and to prepare beds for spring planting. The dormancy of most trees and shrubs adds to the incentive to plant or move them at this time. Garden centers often offer sale prices as incentives to buy in their off season. This is an especially good time to purchase sasanquas [Camellias] as they are in bloom and you can see what you are getting.

Place <u>Christmas trees</u> away from fireplaces, radiators, heat vents and anything else that could dry the needles. Keep your Christmas tree well watered from the time it is brought home until it is discarded. After Christmas, your live tree can be moved outside and be <u>redecorated for the birds</u>. Anchor the tree in a bucket full of damp sand. Put on strings of popcorn and cranberries. Apples, oranges, leftover breads and pine cones covered with peanut butter then dipped in birdseed can also be added. For

#### Vegetables



best results, push the edible ornaments well into the tree.

Vegetables to plant in December include: onions (transplant), shallots (sets or green transplants), spinach, endive, escarole and cabbage (seed or transplant). Root crops and greens may be started. Cabbage, broccoli and cauliflower seed may be planted in cold frames or in protected areas to produce transplants for spring harvest. Plants grow slower later in the fall as daylight diminishes, so you may have to modify the seed packet maturity dates. Add about a third for plants grown from seed, and four weeks for transplants (broccoli, Brussels sprouts, fennel, kale, leek, etc.). Exceptions: Turnips, arugula, mustard greens, cabbages and most lettuces mature on schedule.

### Weeds & Pests



CONTROL WEEDS while they are young and tender, or before their seeds sprout. Potted Plants: check for insect pests and treat accordingly.

LUBBER GRASSHOPPERS are slow and flightless creatures. Insecticides have minimal affect on them. It's easy hunt them down and use scissors; clippers or gloved hands to irradiate these pests mid-summer through late fall to help reduce the spring crop of their offspring.

#### Miscellaneous Odds 'n Ends



WEATHER: BE ATTENTIVE TO WEATHER FORECASTS and protect freeze tender plants. WINTER WATERING SCHEDULES should be adjusted to about 1/3 of the summer frequency for deciduous and dormant plants, but water deeply each time. Winter lawns and growing flowers may require once to twice per week watering depending on weather. Don't over-water.



<u>Decorations:</u> Try your hand at making your own natural holiday decorations. You can make your home more festive by creating door sprays, wreaths, and centerpieces using evergreen boughs, pinecones, and other natural materials. Prolong the life of your decorations by spraying with an antidesiccant spray. <u>Compost:</u> Fireplace ashes can make a nutritional addition to the compost pile, along with fruit and vegetable matter, eggshells, and coffee grounds.

Freeze Preparation and Treatment. Mulch susceptible plants with 6 to 8 inches of pine straw or 4 to 5 inches of leaves. Cut back tropical plants such as Chinese hibiscus before mulching. If rain doesn't precede the cold, water well 3 to 4 days before a hard freeze. Use of a plastic cover can minimize freeze damage, especially if a light bulb is placed under the cover. However, be sure it doesn't touch leaves and remove it as soon as the temperature moderates as the heat generated under a plastic cover can easily burn plants. After the freeze, do not prune back until new growth appears.

Gardening with native or naturalized plants: November is the last month to plant Wildflower seeds for a spring wildflower garden + it's a good time to harvest seeds from your favorite fall blooming wildflowers. Pictured here are a few wildflowers in bloom that readily adapt to a garden environment:











- 1 Climbing Aster {Aster carolinianus} Family: Aster. Blooms: 2" lavender flowers summer > fall. Full sun or shade in any soil
- 2 Spiderwort {Tradescantia ohiensis}. Family: Day flower or Spiderwort {Commelinaceae} Blooms periodically throughout the year in umbel-like clusters of blue/violet [rarely white] of 1" flowers in any soil
- Wild Petunia {Ruellia caroliniensis}. Family: Acanthus {Acanthaceae} Blooms Spring>fall with 1 1/2" bluish-purple flowers in any soil
- 4 "Marsh" Mallow or Swamp Mallow {Kosteletzkya virginica} Family: Malvaceae [mallow] Blooms: pink 2 3/4" hibiscus-like flowers with yellow center, in sun or shade from spring > fall in any moist soil
- 5 Frostweed {Verbesina virginica} Family: Asteraceae. Blooms: clusters of tiny white flowers in the fall. Can grow up to 6' tall in any soil


