

An overlay district and town center would seal efforts to preserve Floral City's ambience.

FLORAL CITY - The scene repeats itself several times each week across the street from David Noble's historic home.

A passer-by pulls off the road, hops out of the car and aims a camera down Floral City's famed avenue of oaks.

The sight reminds Noble

how lucky he is to live in the historic district on Orange Avenue. "It's a common occur-rence," he said. "The canopy, it's what first drew me."

The public fascination with the oak-tunnel thoroughfare reinforces why Noble and a core group of residents want to be sure that Floral City's special ambience never fades.

These days they have a special ally: Citrus County government.

The Floral City Heritage Council, which Noble heads, has been working with county officials on two major projects designed to seal the communi-

ty's historicai roots and guide future development and redevelopment to fit the existing motif.

The community has supported the effort in several surveys and a visioning process in 1999. Floral City residents had just been through the difficult discussions about the widening of U.S. 41 through their community and wanted to weigh in on their own future.


"We had known that we needed to take an active part in the direction we were going in Floral City," Noble said, "We

The red brick firehouse sits largely empty, its yawning bay doors no longer entryways for fire engines and volunteer firefighters. For Beasiley, the Town Center
and the overlay district are the
next logical steps in a process that
Clinus County and Floral City have
taken during the past quarter century. Since the early 1980s, the
county has been through a process
of identifying, defining and protecting, historical resources.

In Floral City the work began

In Floral City the work began in 1982, when the therwice president of the Citrus County Historical Society. Francis Yonkin, cataloged and photographed the historic architecture of the town, which was first surveyed in 1883.

County surveys of historical buildings followed, with awareness peaking in 1987, when the county celebrated its centennial.

In Floral City, residents devised a driving tour in 1991, The National Historic District was recognized, encompassing 18 properties and the oak trees that line Orange Avenue and Aroostook Way. A listing in the National Register of Historic Places came in 1983.

1993.
"Floral City is extremely unique. There is no other historical district in the county." Beasley uaid. It's time we recognize the value of having that, and it's not just for Floral City. It's a jewel for the whole county."

As for the overlay, the first step is to define the area it would cover.

is to define the area it would cover.
Noble said the group is looking
at a zone larger than the actual
historic district. The district lines
follow the oldest homes and the
oak-lined Orange Avenue and
Aroostook Way.
Expanding the area of the overlay would mean taking in some

where properties are getting more rundown and where modern-style structures have replaced the old, rustic and historic styles from the

The group is also looking to the immediate waterfront areas and extending to the west side of U.S. 41 into areas as fir west as the family home of the late Hampson Duon, newspaper man, historian and author of Bock Home: A History of Citrus County.

"In Floral City we're looking at preserving their heritage and their sense of place, said Chuck Dixon, the county's community develop-ment director.

ment director.

He is in the earliest stages of preparing the overlay district, examining serial maps, looking at the existing buildings and working on a list of interested stakeholders. Soon they will sit together at the table and begin to talk about what a Fioral City overlay should include. "It will be tailored to their needs," Dixon said.

The process could stretch into 2007

"We have to look at both the residential and the commercial component, the beight and bulk of buildings, whether to restrict the size of buildings, what to do with institutional buildings," Dixon said, "There are a lot of components to Floral City."

Unlike the overlay district that the County Commission recently approved for Old Homosassa, which set up design standards based on the Cracker style of many homes in that area, Floral City doesn't have a standard house de-sign in its historic area.

"We don't have a particular style, but we have a particular style, but we have a lime period" which is roughly 1890 through the 1930s, Noble said. "We have vari-ous styles within that time frame. If we can approve that kind of archi-tectural restriction, that would be

Damato said the county really needs to stop up and be the leader on the project, especially since the county owns the three buildings. "We should lead the way, and the private sector will follow," he said.

He said the bope is that, with an overlay in place, as new busi-nesses come in, they can meet the design standards set out in those-new rules. new roles

"We're not opposed to com-mercial development," but hope that it will fit with the surrounding community, Noble said Standards need to be in place as the growth comes "so we don't get the big box stores."

Durato said that revitalizing towa will do wonders to turn

the towar will do wonders to turn the commercial zone around. He said he is confident that once the projects are going, the downtown area will see private interests wanting to be a part of the new Floral City. Business people will invest in a place where there is a plan," Damato said, Lenders will be more willing to lend. Business people will feel more confident that they will be able to succeed.

"That's who it needs to be

"That's why it needs to be done. The county shows a plan, and the county becomes a facilita-tor," he said. By not making plan-ning choices, "we set the county back."

"Good things don't just happen. They happen because you are working toward a final goal," he said.

The Floral City residents and county officials all know that the time to set up a plan is now because development is racing across the region.

"Citrus County is growing right now," said county Commissioner Joyce Valentino. "If we can get this plan in place, the quicker, the better."

She favors the projects the Her-

itage Council has undertaken.

"Our heritage here in Citrus County, it's part of what we are," she said. "This will protect our heritage. It will protect our citizens.'

Bonsai is the art of sculptur-

ing normal-size living plants into miniature plants through time. It is an ancient art form. Introduced in Japan about 1,000 years ago and arriving in Britain at the beginning of the 20th century, bonsai really caught the eye of the public in the United States about 25 years ago. Bonsai plants can now be found in all sorts of gardening shops.

The sight of a miniature tree or plant growing in a small pot draws a special fascination for many. At first sight, one would expect these to be ideal for indoor houseplants, but be

warned - popular types of Bassett will outline the work to evergreens or maples belong outside, growing in the climate that they would ordinarily grow in if they had not been dwarfed.

There are exceptions, and some plants are selected for inside bonsai.

The History of Arbor Day

The idea for Arbor Day originally came from Nebraska ... a treeless plain. It was the lack of trees there that led to the founding of Arbor Day in the 1800s by J. Sterling Morton ... He and his wife, lovers of nature, quickly planted trees, shrubs and flowers around their new home after moving from Detroit.

Morton, a journalist, became editor of Nebraska's first newspaper and spread agricultural information and his enthusiasm for trees and encouraged everyone including civic organizations and groups to join in. They missed their trees, but trees were needed as windbreaks to keep soil in place, for fuel and building materials, and for shade from the hot sun.

Arbor Day's Beginnings

On January 4, 1872, Morton first proposed a tree-planting holiday to be called "Arbor Day" at a meeting of the State Board of Agriculture. The date was set for April 10, 1872. Prizes were offered to counties and individuals for planting properly the largest number of trees on that day. It was estimated that more than one million trees were planted in Nebraska on the first Arbor Day.

Arbor Day was officially proclaimed by the young state's Gov. Robert W. Furnas on March 12, 1874, and the day itself was observed April 10, 1874. In 1885, Arbor Day was named a legal holiday in Nebraska and April 22, Morton's birthday, was selected as the date for its permanent observance.

This ended the first celebration of Arbor Day as a legal holiday, and, as reported by the newspaper, "... to say that it was a complete success but faintly expresses it. A celebration of this kind results in good to all, and is worthy of imitation by every school in the state."

During the 1870s, other states passed legislation to observe Arbor Day, and the tradition began in schools nationwide in 1882.

Arbor Day has now spread beyond the United States and is observed in many countries of the world.

The Floral City Garden Club is proud to continue this very worthy tradition by having a part in adding these 2 Live Oaks to the Avenue of Oaks and donating them to Floral City.



District V of the Florida Federation of Garden Clubs is putting on "Water — A Celebration of Life: Naturally" on Feb. 23 and 24 at Fanning Springs State Park and in the town of Trenton.

Garden Club reaches 50

mong the various environs one sees when entering Floral City on U.S. Highway

41 South Florida Avenue are forty-one sable palms located in the state right-of-way and north and south of the traffic light at County Road 48. Over the years these palms have gotten rather "lost" with the addition of signs, businesses and other vegetation along the road that began as State Road 5 — Cleveland Avenue.

Back in the 1960s continuous rows of these palms lined either side of the highway and were planted as one of many beautification projects by the relatively new Floral Garden Club. The group formed in 1956 and joined the Florida Federation of Garden Clubs two years later. As the number of garden clubs in the federation increased, the Floral Garden Club changed its name to Floral City Garden Club to better associate itself with the historic village. However, membership is not restricted to Floral City.

Residents today greatly appreciate how the lovely Floral City Park south of town has developed into a well used, well cared-for recreation area. When the park was first established, it was the Floral Garden Club who planted and maintained the entrance.

And when the little Floral City Library was constructed on Orange Avenue, it was the Floral Garden Club that planted and maintained the landscaping.

An attempt in the early '70s at beautifying the town with

wooden half-barrels over flowing with flowers met with disaster when the barrels were stolen. For more than a decade that put the proverbial "damper" on the club's interest in beautification. However, as new members joined the club in the early '80s, sunnier days returned for the club as well as for the town.

The club continued its strong support of the Citrus County Fair by providing Standard Flower Shows each year in the Horticulture Building. "Xeriscape" became the buzz word during this time and the club designed and installed an exhibition garden with interpretive signage in front of the Floral City Post Office. This was a project for the 20th anniversary of Earth Day and that garden was maintained by the club for many years until the post office took it over.

In the '90s, and to date, the club has taken a leadership role in beautification of Floral City. Much remains to be accomplished, but much has been done by the club joining forces with the county's

roadside maintenance division, other organizations and with private individuals in the community.

Joining the county's Project Pride which established the Adopt-a-Highway program in 1989, club members have been picking up other people's trash along a two mile stretch, four times a year for the






From left to right, the Memorial Garden and the labyrinth next

the community center in Floral City, and the historic oaks overhanging Orange Avenue. All nature projects supported by the Garden Club past 17 years. Part of Project Pride was historic preservation and along those lines the club began an effort with the county to replace lost historic oak trees in the National Register Historic District.

Two major, multiple plantings were accomplished before a certified arborist joined the club and now one or two top grade, 15 to 20-

foot tall trees are purchased and planted an-

nually. In preparation for the Orange Avenu roostook Way Historic Corridor, the club joined finances with the Floral City Heritage Council to have each of the 126 trees on the full length of Orange Avenue, Aroostook Way and the three trees on the northwest corner of U.S. 41 evaluated for health and preservation. A Tree Preservation Plan has been developed.

Other major beautification/education projects that the club has planned, developed and maintained are the Floral City Community Memorial Garden next to the library with the first in-ground labyrinth in the county, the native plantings at the Jenrette Gazebo Site and a butterfly garden, both on the Withlacooch ate Trail, the Floral City Elementary School butterfly garden and nature mural across the full length of one building and native plantings and the painting at the east-end gateway welcome sign.

In alignment with the Floral City Vision Action Plan, the club also supports and works closely with the Floral City Heritage Council on the overall preservation and enhancement of Floral City's rural historic character and natu- * ral waterways.
